The writers of The Max Prince Show

Kenny Franks was born in Chicago to Jewish immigrants from Poland. His father was a barber and his mother, may she rest in peace, did her best to put up with his father. Moving with his family to Los Angeles, young Kenny got his start writing for stand-up comics and pitching jokes to up-and-coming comedians. Then he got his big break and moved to New York to write for the Max Prince Show. Kenny is a studied genius. He never rushes the joke. His style is deliberate and dialogue driven. And while he thinks the guys in the writers' room are immature little children, he has the sense to realize that that's where all the creativity comes from. And damn it if he doesn't love the bastards.

Milt Fields, king of the one-liners, has been with the Max Prince Show since day one. With his flair for dressing and perfect comedic timing, he hopes to one day take Hollywood by storm, or sleep his way to the top. Always available, always open, always looking. Ba-dum-dum.

Lucas Brickman grew up in Pigeon Forge, Tennessee and, as the smallest of six brothers, learned the power of laughter at a young age. Moving to New York to study at Columbia University's prestigious School of the Arts, Lucas left college after only two semesters to pursue a career as one of the city's many starving playwrights. Surviving through two years of rejection by producers, Lucas booked his first play, Bananas on Broadway, in a small off-Broadway theater (way off Broadway – ok, it was in Queens) to less than thunderous acclaim. The show ran for only four performances, but was unexpectedly seen, on closing night, by Brian Doyle, one of the talented writers of The Max Prince Show. Mr. Doyle recommended Lucas for an open spot on the show's writing staff, where he has worked for the past nine months. For him, it is a dream come true.

Val Skolsky was born in 1913, with some help from his Mother and Father, in Odessa, Ukraine which was part of the then Russian Empire. In 1926, he immigrated to the United States. So, in Russia before he was old enough to be bar mitzvahed, Val went through anti-semitic pogroms, World War I, the Russian Civil War, several Ukrainian independence movements, the founding of the Soviet Union, and the Russian famine of 1921. "This created the condition where humor becomes anger made acceptable with a joke, but I wouldn't exactly recommend it to aspiring comedians." After surviving all of that, what was left but to go into show business?

Carol Wyman grew up a loud, fat Jewish kid in a rough Italian neighborhood in Brooklyn. (My father never did have any sense of direction) Being funny was her salvation and her ticket out. She attended Columbia University on a cross-country bowling scholarship and graduated suma cum laude with a degree in writing. Thanks to connections made in school and lots of hard work she made her way up the ranks of the NBC ladder to the best job in show biz--writer for the mighty Max Prince. She sends love and gratitude to her husband Matthew Boaz Wyman for putting up with her crazy hours and constant one-liners.

Brian Doyle graduated from Columbia University with an MFA in Screenwriting and Treatment. This is his third year writing for *The Max Prince Show*. Previous writing credits include but are not limited to: *The Bob and Stan Hour (WXPA)*, *The George Zahn Show (ABC)*, and *The Carruthers Brothers Variety Show (NBC.)* He has finished his first full length play, *West Upton*, and is also working with MGM on several projects including his own screenplay, *Lines Heard On Vacation In Stockholm*.

Ira Stone's brilliant career began in radio as the lead writer on "The Pepsodent Hour Starring Max Prince" from 1932-1938. Following a series of hospitalizations for various complaints that doctors could not identify the cause of (and ultimately dismissed as chronic hypochondria), he was removed as head writer but retained by Prince at his old salary level. Stone later followed Prince to NBC and wrote for *The Max Prince Show*. Famous for long stretches of inactivity followed by explosions of genius, the erratic Stone is something of a legend among comedy writers, though actual sightings of him in the office working are as rare as sightings of unicorns, fairies, and mermaids.

Max Prince was born in Yonkers, New York to immigrant parents who ran a 23 ½ hour laundromat/luncheonette called *Ralph and Ida's Laundroluncheonette*. Their motto; we only close for 30 minutes a day, what about you? Max had the filthy and hungry patrons laughing by the spin cycle at his observational and ostentatious character driven humor. He soon added mediocre saxophone playing to his repertoire to entertain the customers. Max moved then moved on to pursue a career in music but was waylaid by the war. In the Navy Band his comedy routines, originally added to fill time between numbers, got more applause then his saxophone playing. Aaron Lieberman, the shows director, noticed his on-stage antics and later became the producer of Max's own hour and half Emmy Award winning comedy review TV show.

Helen was born in Norfolk, Virginia where she attended Norfolk High and was a pep squad captain for the Norfolk Bucks. She grew up tending to her ten younger brothers and sisters and, to the dismay of her parents, moved to the Big Apple immediately. She attended Miss Kitty's Secretarial Academy excelling in shorthand typing, message taking, and plant watering. Helen enjoys spending time alone in her Brooklyn one-bedroom and on Sundays off, she often visits the Bronx Zoo to remind her of childhood.

America at Mid-Century

The early 1950s were a magical time. The war was over. We were happy to be alive. And we were grateful. There was a feeling of hope and opportunity that permeated the country. There was a feeling of optimism. There was the sense that anything was attainable if you were willing to work hard enough for it. Walking around New York City, you could feel a tangible electricity in the air. Men all wore suits and ties. Women wore hats and gloves and dresses. There was a sense of style, of elegance, of belonging. But, in television entertainment....the times were changing.

Dawn Erin is delighted to be back on the City Theatre stage again. She was last seen as Kate in City's 2008 production of *Taming of the Shrew* and also performed as Amy Lee in *Laundry and Bourbon*. Favorite past roles include Mrs. Cheveley in *An Ideal Husband*, Olivia in *Twelfth Night*, and the title role in *Medea*. Dawn is a graduate of The American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York City and is represented by DVA Talent. She sends love and thanks to Matty, Billy and all her dogs, and dedicates her performance in this show to the memory of her Rottweiler mix Itchypup, who kept her laughing for 9 wonderful years.

Judd Farris received his BFA in Acting from Texas State Universiy. He is an original member of The Theatre Collective, The Search Party and company member of Austin Shakespeare Festival. Craig Kanne has done many shows in Austin since moving here in 1980 to attend St. Edward's University. However, this is his first with the City Theatre Company. He dreamed for a long time of being in the room with Caesar, Brooks, Gelbart, etc. working on comedy. Now he gets the chance, sort of.
