Macbeth and the Witches' Evils

It's difficult to date any of Shakespeare's plays with certainty. We simply don't have any concrete evidence. The best guess seems to be that *Macbeth* was written around 1606. It was believed, based on the writings of Raphael Holinshed, that King James could trace his lineage to a figure named Banquo, although Banquo now seems to be fictional. The

real Macbeth was not a villain. He won the throne on the battlefield, in a manner consistent with the Scottish code of honor of the day, probably fatally wounding Duncan himself during the battle. Macbeth ruled as King of Alba (Scotland was not yet a unified nation) for around nineteen years, and his reign was stable enough that he was able to make a pilgrimage to Rome.

It's important to bear in mind that witches were still considered to be powerful forces of evil. According to the *Malleus Malificarum*, a medieval witch hunting manual, disbelief in witchcraft was the greatest heresy. The *Malleus* was the second most popular book (behind the Bible, of course) in Europe for a hundred years. To put it in context, the Salem witch trials happened around eighty years after *Macbeth* was first performed. King James personally presided over a few witch trials. James even wrote a book about

witchcraft, called *The Demonology*. James believed that there were two kinds of witches, those who do the bidding of devils (who can still be redeemed), and those who command devils (who are beyond redemption). Another thread woven into the play is the Gunpowder Plot. A group of Catholics had planned to blow up Parliament - a plot equivalent to destroying all three branches of American government - and install a Catholic monarch. A Jesuit tract called *A Treatise on Equivocation* was in associated with the plot. For more information on this, I recommend Garry Wills' book, *Witches & Jesuits.* – Kevin Gates, Director

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
