After a several year hiatus from WOBCP, she found her way back on the boards (and can't wait to return there) as Elaine in Last of the Red Hot Lovers: When not on stage, Tracy divides her time between working for a professional Murder Mystery company, wrangling her dogs and being a cat-herder...which is a much more treacherous and thankless job than herding actors.

Russ Wiseman (Cesting Director, Set Designer): Russell has been involved in the performing arts in one way or another since high school. He has served on the Theatre faculty at Elmira College and Trenton State College. He has served as Executive/Artistic Director for the Herbor Playhouse in Corpus Christi, TX; the Rochester Civic Theatre in Rochester, MN and the Temple Civic Theatre in Temple, TX. He is currently the Manager for the Dougherty Arts Center in the Parks Department for the City of Austin. He enjoys traveling, good food and his friends. He has had a wonderful time directing "Noises Off" and is honored to direct the first main stage production in Way Off Broadway Community Player's new home.





Skip Dunnett (Assistant Director): Last season, Skip marked an end to her hiatus and returned to doing what she loves, backstage, around stage, anywhere but on stage and was the AD for *The Boys Next Door*: Skip started her theater career in Rochester, MN at the Rochester Civic Theater and Rochester Repertory Theater Company, then moved to Ann Arbor, MI and worked at The Performance Network there while her husband, Dave Bachmann was busy getting his Master's and PhD (of course, Skip was gainfully employed as a medical secretary at the Mayo Clinic and University Hospital in Ann Arbor). When Dave took a job with IBM in Austin they moved here and one day shortly after that there was an article in a local paper stating a group was trying to start a local theater company — and thus began her involvement with WOBCP. Skip is now retired from



A Note from the Director - Russell L. Wiseman

It is my great pleasure to bring *Moises Off* to the stage again. I offered Doty, Lloyd, Brooke, Selsdon and the rest to the public some years ago in Corpus Christi. While there are many similarities from one production of Noises Off to another, including the mechanics of changing the scenic environment from Act I to Act II to Act III, the are many differences as well. The trick is to amplify the comedic values always contained in the script and available to every production, with the uniqueness of the current production. So, what stays the same, what evolves and what is new and often surprisingly different? The play always remains the story of a theater company of questionable discipline mounting a production of the equally questionable "Nothing On". Perhaps most obviously, the characters stay the same but the actors playing those characters are different from production to production and the chemistry between them is unique to each production, sometimes unique to each performance. This is the most visible and manageable of differences. Each new performer brings his pr her own perspective and skills to an established character. The actors may say the same words (hopefully) but the manner in which they say those things is a combination of the current actor's resources (physical emotional and psychological) and the director's vision and creativity (also hopefully). This can and does lead to new interpretations and unexpected destinations. Voices are different, energy is different and reactions are different which all add up to a new version of an oft performed play. This is true of many other aspects of theatrical production that are unique to every new production. The design team is different. The production company is different and even the theater is different. So where does that leave us? WORCP would be remiss if all we did was to trot out old and used ideas in the quise of a new production so we won't, or didn't. We simply offer you a new production of a script that some of us have worked with in the past. New actors, new direction, new sets and costumes and a new concept all rolled up in a funny and established script. All for you. Thank you for your time, your resources and your support of your friends and neighbors. For those of you experiencing Noises Off for the first time, welcome and enjoy yourselves. For those of your attending Noises Off having seen it elsewhere welcome to a new version of an old friend



Behind the Dressing Room Doors

DOTTY OTLEY (Mrs. Clacket) makes a welcome return to the stage to create the role of Mrs. Clackett after playing Mrs. Hackett, Britain's most famous lollipop lady ('ooh, I can't 'ardly 'old me lolly up!') in over 320 episodes of TV's **Dn the Zebras** Her many stage appearances include her critically acclaimed portrayal of Fru Sackett, the comic char in Strindberg's **Scenes from the Charnelhouse** Her first appearance ever? In a school production of Henry IV, Part I - as the old bag -lady, Mrs. Duckett.

BELINDA BLAIR (Flavia Brent) has been on the stage since the age of four, when she made her debut in Sinbad the Sailor at the old Croydon Hippodrome as one of Miss Tani Tanner's Ten Tapping Tots. She subsequently denced her way round this country, Southern Africa and the Fer East in shows like Zippedy Doodel And Here Comes Les Girls! More recently she has been seen in such comedy hits as Don't Mr. Duddiel. Who's Been Steeping in My Bed? And Twice Two is Sex. She is merried to scriptwriter Terry Wough, who has contributed lead-in material to most of TV's chat shows. They have two sons and three retrievers.

GARRY LeJEUNE (Roger Tramplemain) while still at drama school won the coveted Laetitia Daintyman Medal for Violence. His television work includes *Policel Crime Squad. Swat. Forensic* and *The Nick* but he is probably best known as "Cornetto", the ice cream salesman who stirs the hearts of all the Iollipop ladies in *On the Zabra*:

SELSDON MOWBRAY (Burgler) first "trod the boards" at the age of 12 - playing Lucius in a touring production of
LuliusCaesar; with his father, the great Chelmsford Mowbray, in the lead. Since then he has served in various local reps,
claims to have appeared with every company to have toured Shakespeare in the past half-century, working his way up
through the Mustardseads and the various Boys and Sons of, to the Balthazers, Berwolios and Le Beaus; then the Slenders,
Lennoxes, Trinculos, Snouts and Froths; and graduating to the Scroops, Poloniuses and the Aguecheeks. His most recent film
appearance was as Outraged Pensioner in Green Willies.

Possset (milk curdled with ale or vineger) was one of the first foods to be processed by industrial methods. In the sixteenth century, virtuelly every village had its posset milt, though few heve survived. Their functioning was besed on the common observation that milk tends to curdle more readily on thundery summer days. In a posset milt, production was maintained throughout the year by allowing the milk to run into a heated curdling chamber where the flow of incoming ale or vinegar was ingeniously harnessed to operate a kind of simple theatrical thundersheet. The product was then packed in small "yoggy pots" made from the scrota of wild yogs

- Jenet Thrice: The Tudor Food Industry




