Texas State Department of Theatre and Dance

Welcome to our 2012-2013 Season. We are presenting what we believe will be an exciting array of classical and contemporary shows. We are a robust department with approximately 430 theatre majors, 20 graduate students, and 200 dance majors. We are proud of the accomplishments of our faculty and students.

The Theatre and Dance faculty continues to earn both national and international acclaim. In recent years, faculty have had their designs displayed at the Prague Quadrennial, won an international playwriting competition in Belgium, and had their plays produced in New York. Faculty members have worked on Broadway and on National Tours. They have worked at the Kennedy Center, Utah Shakespearean Festival, Illinois Shakespeare Festival, Zachary Scott Theatre, Pasadena Playhouse, Asolo Theatre, Actors Theatre of Louisville, Austin Lyric Opera, Actors' Gang, Los Angeles's Colony Theatre, and been on original cast albums. In addition, Dance faculty have choreographed or performed in Greece, France, Germany, Spain, Scotland, Costa Rica, Mexico, Guatemala, Colorado, Utah, Nevada, Los Angeles, and New York.

Faculty have also been active in scholarly endeavors, as their articles have graced the cover of American Theatre, their books have been nominated for awards, and they have been asked to be featured speakers at national conferences. Likewise, graduate students have increasingly presented their research at both national and international conferences. In 2009, a Texas State grad student won the KC/ACTF National Student Playwriting Award, and in 2011, another won the KC/ACTF O'Neill National Critics Institue Award.

Our undergraduate students have also been extremely successful. Each year, multiple students have earned honors at the state and regional levels of the American College Theatre Festival and American College Dance Festival. For each of the past 11 years our department has been recognized at the Kennedy Center. Individual students have been national finalists in the areas of scene design, lighting design, costume design, sound design, directing, acting, stage management, playwriting, dramaturgy, and criticism. In 2009, we were one of four schools chosen to have a play performed at the Kennedy Center. In addition, since 2003 the department has offered a summer study abroad in collaboration with the Royal Shakespeare Institute in Stratford-upon-Avon, England.

A Note on the Text

Joe Falocco, Assistant Professor of English; Texas State University, San Marcos.

Although <u>Richard III</u> is one of Shakespeare's most popular plays, it has rarely been staged in its entirety as originally published. Nothing is known of specific productions during Shakespeare's lifetime, but the 3,600 lines of the received text [1.] were too long for the "two hours' traffic" that constituted the standard time of performance at public amphitheatres. <u>Richard III</u> was probably therefore abridged in its original stagings, yet there is no way of knowing what material was cut, or whether Shakespeare's company anticipated later theatrical practice by appending material from the <u>Henry VI</u> plays to clarify <u>Richard's</u> confusing story line. Evidence of similar adaptation during the early modern era comes from the "Dering Manuscript," a composite version of the two parts of <u>Henry IV</u>. Once thought to represent the text used at a 1613 court performance, more recent scholarship suggests that this manuscript was prepared for amateur use in or around 1622. The tradition of combining scenes from various history plays in performance thus predates the First Folio.

In 1700, actor-manager Colley Cibber re-wrote Shakespeare's play. streamlining the plot and incorporating exposition from 3 Henry VI. Cibber's Richard III, not Shakespeare's, was the only version performed in Britain and America until Samuel Phelps's abortive attempt to revive the original text in 1845. There then followed a century-long period of negotiation between "Cibber" and "Shakespeare." Many practitioners during this era, including Richard Mansfield and John Barrymore, sought to retain Cibber's narrative clarity while restoring much of Shakespeare's poetry. Laurence Olivier's 1955 cinematic Richard III is generally seen as the last gasp of the Cibber tradition. In the decades following this film, performance scripts have tended to stick more faithfully to the received text. While many critics see this as a positive development that reflects an increased appreciation of Shakespeare's work, stagings employing a fuller text have rarely succeeded as well as the more radical revisions of earlier eras. Such a production, as Dan Hulbert writes of the Atlanta Shakespeare Tavern's 1998 full-text Richard, often "feels like every minute of its three hours." [2.] Our current performance script therefore embraces the earlier tradition of theatrical adaptation. It incorporates key action from 3 Henry VI and simplifies the complex and episodic story that Shakespeare inherited from his chronicle sources. While no Richard III can ever be "definitive," we hope that the present offering will provide playgoers with an accessible introduction to Shakespeare's greatest villain.

Richard III Synopsis

Act I

Alone in his office, Richard watches video footage of his family's recent victory over a rival faction. In these clips, Richard and his brothers, Edward and Clarence, defeat the army of Queen Margaret and murder her son (also named Edward). Then Richard is seen murdering Margaret's husband, King Henry. Finally, Richard's brother Edward is enthroned victorious with his new queen Elizabeth and their two sons (also named Richard and Edward) by his side.

At the end of these clips, Richard announces his dissatisfaction with the current situation and his desire to become king. The first step in this process will be Richard's marriage to Lady Anne, the widow of the slaughtered Prince and the daughter-in-law of dead King Henry. Anne enters, accompanying Henry's body, and Richard audaciously woos her. He then tells the audience that he has planted evidence of treachery regarding his brother Clarence. As a result, Clarence is sent to prison, and Richard hires two cut-throats to murder him in captivity.

Richard now bides his time until his brother King Edward, "wracked with sad diseases born of lust," dies. Along with his ally Buckingham, Richard then concocts a scheme to separate the new King (also named Edward) and his brother young York (also named Richard) from the influence of their mother. The Princes will be locked in the tower for safe keeping, with Richard serving as Regent or Protector until they come of age.

Meanwhile, Richard spreads rumors about the legitimacy of these young royals, and uses Buckingham to stir up acclamation for Richard to take the throne himself. After feigning reticence, Richard accepts and is proclaimed King.

Act II

Richard cannot be comfortable as long as rivals to his throne exist, so he asks Buckingham to murder the young Princes in the Tower. Buckingham demurs, and Richard instead engages Tyrrell for this assassination. Fallen out of favor, Buckingham vows to revolt against Richard.

The dead children's mother (former Queen Elizabeth) and grandmother (who is also King) Richard's mother) bewail their loss. They are confronted by the deposed Queen Margaret who triumphs in their sorrow. Richard then asks Elizabeth for the hand of her daughter (also named Elizabeth) in order to shore up his claim to the throne. In an aside, Elizabeth tells the audience that she will pretend to comply but actually send her daughter to marry Richmond, the surviving heir of the rival faction who is currently abroad planning an invasion.

Messengers arrive to announce that Richmond's army has attacked and that Buckingham has been captured. Richard vows to confront Richmond in open battle. Stanley sends word that, while he secretly supports Richmond's cause, he must feign loyalty to Richard for the sake of his family's safety.

The night before the climactic battle, Richard and Richmond are both visited by the ghosts of Richard's victims, all of whom pray for Richmond's victory. Richard awakes shaken and full of guilt, but vows to fight valiantly to the end. He does so, but is killed by Richmond who announces he will marry Princess Elizabeth and unite the two warring factions: Lancaster and York.

The Company

Chuck Ney (Director) is a professor and Head of Directing in the Department of Theatre & Dance at Texas State University. He has been artistic director at Idaho Repertory Theatre, Manhattan Clearing House, and Mary Moody Northen Theatre. He has directed at such theatres as New York City's Working Man's Clothes Theatre, Illinois Shakespeare Festival, Texas Shakespeare Festival, Idaho Repertory Theatre, Kennedy Center, and Manhattan Clearing House Contemporary Performing Arts Center. Recent directing credits include Measure for Measure, As You Like It, Macbeth, Much Ado About Nothing, Going after Cacciato (world premiere of Romulus Linney's adaptation of Tim O'Brien's novel), The Comedy of Errors, A Little Night Music, Transposing Shakespeare, and Tongue of a Bird. Since 2004 he has traveled to Shakespeare theaters from coast to coast, interviewing over 60 artistic directors and directors about their working methods and productions. He has written articles for American Theatre and is presently finishing a book, Directing Shakespeare in America. He received his PhD from the University of Illinois, MFA from Southern Methodist University, and his BFA from Illinois Wesleyan University.

Eugene Lee (Richard, Duke of Gloucester) Eugene Lee's career as an actor goes back as far as a command performance of a University Drama department production of A Raisin in the Sun for President Lyndon Johnson on his Texas ranch in 1972 and television episodes of, Dallas, Good Times, The White Shadow, The Guiding Light, playing coroner Hud Sanders on The District, The Women of Brewster Place mini-series with Oprah Winfrey, The Jackson Five: An American Dream and recent features Blacklisted, Coach Carter and the Indie Feature, Wolf. On the professional stage as far back as the original cast of Pulitzer Prize winning A Soldier's Play by Charles Fuller with the Negro Ensemble Company to a Broadway appearance in August Wilson's Gem of the Ocean.
