#### Georges Fevdeau

(December 8, 1862 - June 5, 1921) was born in Paris, the son of novelist and a Polish woman. At the age of twenty, he wrote his first comic monologue. He found his first success four years later with *Tailleur pour dames* (Ladies' Dressmaker, 1889). That same year Feydeau married Marianne Carolus-Duran.

Feydeau began a study of great farces in 1890. This study brought him success with his play *Champignol malgré lui* (Champignol in Spite of Himself, 1892). Following this, Feydeau made a name for himself both in France and abroad, some of his plays opening overseas and in other languages before they opened in France. The plays are noted for their great wit and

complex plots, featuring misunderstandings and coincidences, and what one critic called "jack-in-the-box construction".

Though critics at the time dismissed Feydeau's works as light entertainment, he is now regarded as one of the great French playwrights of his era. His plays are seen today as prescursors to Surrealist and Dada theatre, and the Theatre of the Absurd.

Despite being a very successful playwright, high living, gambling and the failure of his marriage led to financial difficulties. During the winter of 1918 Feydeau contracted syphilis and slowly descended into madness in the remaining years of his life.

## COMPANY BIOGRAPHIES

Prior to coming to Austin he was Associate Producer for the inaugural season of the Los Angeles Theatre Center, he was Associate Producer/Director of the Cincinnatti Playhouse in the Park for three seasons, and he founded Theatre Center of Mississippi, the state's first Equity theatre. He has also produced and directed at New Stage Theatre, Bucks County Playhouse, Theatre Midland and Theatre Four in New York City. For Austin Playhouse he has produced and directed Dancing at Lughnasa, Amadeus, A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, Blithe Spirit, Stones in His Pockets, Les Liaisons Dangereuses, Don't Dress for Dinner, Inherit the Wind, The Threepenny Opera, Steel Magnolias, An Ideal Husband, The Night Hank Williams Died, The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas, The Odd Couple, House, A Man for All Seasons, The Mystery of Edwin Drood, Rumors, Enchanted April, Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, The Underpants, Kiss Me Kate, Private Lives, Travesties, The Dead Presidents' Club, Damn Yankees, A Christmas Carol, Copenhagen, The Man Who Came to Dinner, Blues in the Night, The Seagull, Arcadia, The Fantasticks, Mahalia, and Light Up the Sky. He appeared in Austin Playhouse productions of Heroes, Afterplay and The Threepenny Opera.

Paige Binder (Stage Manager) has worked with Austin Playhouse since 2002 in technical and stage management positions. She recently stage managed the Austin Playhouse production of *Heroes* and designed lights for Weird Sisters' productions of *The Merry Wives of Windsor* and *Twelfth Night*. She is currently attending U.T. Austin as a Humanities major.

Don Day (Lighting Designer) has been designing professionally for over 30 years winning both Austin Circle of Theatre and Austin Critics' Table awards for his work. Don designed light for the Austin Playhouse productions of Dancing at Lughnasa, It's a Wonderful Life, Sylvia, Dug Up, Amadeus, A Funny...Forum, Blithe Spirit, Speed the Plow, Les Liaisons Dangereuses, Stones in His Pockets, Don't Dress for Dinner, Inherit the Wind, Exits and Entrances, Women Who Steal, The Threepenny Opera, An Ideal Husband, The Night Hank Williams Died, The Dead Presidents' Club, The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas, The Odd Couple and House. He is currently having a great time working with students as Technical Director at Southwestern University in Georgetown. He also recently designed lights for Dog Sees God for Hyde Park Theatre. Don holds an MFA from the University Of Texas.

Buffy Manners (Costume Designer) has designed Dancing at Lughnasa, Sylvia, Blithe Spirit, Les Liaisons Dangereuses, The Threepenny Opera, An Ideal Husband, A Man for All Seasons, A Texas Romance, Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, Travesties, The Fantastics, The Seagull, and The Merry Wives of Windsor (a coproduction with Austin Shakespeare Festival) for Austin Playhouse. She designed all shows under the direction of Don Toner at the State Theatre. She has been nominated for several B. Iden Payne Awards for her work. She has also been nominated for Austin Critics Table Awards for her costume designs for An Ideal Husband, A Macbeth, The Merry Wives of Windsor, Henry V, and Mrs. Warren's Profession. Before getting involved in theatre, Ms Manners started her costume design career in the dance world with Austin Ballet Theatre in the days when they performed at the Armadillo World

The Gunn Brothers (Sound Designers) Gordon and Jimy have been have been recognized many times over with B. Iden Payne and Critics' Table awards and nominations. Costume credits include work for the Lone Star Lyric Opera in Houston, The Rocky Horror Picture Show (cutter/draper) and Seussical: The Musical, both at Southwestern. She has also worked on costumes for Caucasian Chalk Circle. Annie Get Your Gun, and The Waiting Room for the 2008-2009 season at Pflugerville High School.

Douglas Taylor (Dr. Finache) Mr. Taylor's work as an actor has taken him from Beeville, TX. to New York City. But most of his career in the theatre has been spent right here in Austin, where he was included in the Austin Chronicle's "Most Valuable Players," a guide to Austin's top forty stage actors. Some of Mr. Taylor's favorite performances are Hercule Poirot in Black Coffee, J. Frank Dobie in Night Swim by Steve Moore, the bartenders in Fish by Cyndi Williams and "40's" in THEM by Michael Mitchell. Mr. Taylor was recognized by his peers with the B. Iden Payne Award for his work in The Mystery of Irma Vep, and the Austin Critics' Table has acknowledged his work in a number of productions. In New York, Mr. Taylor performed in Eugene O'Neill's Sniper with Expanded Arts Theatre (Off-Broadway) and Shakespeare in the Park(ing) Lot's The Taming of the Shrew (way, WAY, Off-Broadway) Mr. Taylor's
