DIRECTOR'S NOTE

In this imaginative re-telling of The Odyssey, Anon is a refugee, separated from his mother in a terrible storm at sea. He miraculously survives only to be thrust into a world filled with monsters and sorceresses masquerading as butchers and bar maids. Like Odysseus, Anon aches to return home. Yet how can he return 'home' when the world he knows is destroyed by war and his loved ones are lost, presumably forever?

Commissioned in 2006, Anon(ymous) resonates profoundly against the backdrop of our current immigration challenges. In January President Trump signed his first travel ban barring travel from Syria and other nations. The U.S. reached our newly established refugee cap of 50,000 in July, 41% below the previous fiscal year and the lowest cap in over a decade, while the world refugee crisis is on the rise. A proposal to end the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program puts the most innocent asylum seekers at risk of deportation to countries they have never known.

Anon's name derives in part from the dissonance between who he is on the inside and the roles he must adopt outwardly to survive. His name also reminds us how easy it becomes for us to view the 'other' as nameless and fail to comprehend an individual's struggle. How many more must disappear, become invisible, shed their skins or change their names?

PATRICK GATHRON

(Pascal) is an American actor from Dallas, Texas. He has guest-starred in HBO's The Leftovers and ABC's American Crime and will appear in the newest TV series on National

Geographic, *The Long Road Home*, premiering Nov. 7. Gathron will also be making his on-screen debut in the James Cameron-produced action-adventure film *Alita: Battle Angel*, due in theaters July 2018. K. ELIOT HAYNES (Projection and Sound Designer) is an award-winning designer and the assistant technical director of Mary Moody Northen Theatre. MMNT designs include Rhinoceros, Mr. Burns, a post-electric play, To Kill A Mockingbird, The Spitfire Grill, The Importance of Being Earnest, Blood Wedding, Misalliance, The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui, and Pride and Prejudice. Other designs include Frankenstein, The Crapstall Street Boys, The Wars of Heaven (Trouble Puppet Theater); The Orchid Flotilla, Once There Were Six Seasons (Glass Half Full); Buyer and Cellar, Doubt, Red Hot Patriot, This Wonderful Life (ZACH Theatre); Call of The Wild and Gretel (Theatre Heroes).

MARIA ANTONIETA (TONI) BRAVO

(Choreograper) is originally from Mexico City and naturalized American. She has worked around the world as a dancer, educator and choreographer. In Austin, her work has been presented by Austin Shakespeare; VORTEX Repertory Theatre; The University of Texas at Austin Department of Theater and Dance, and Butler Opera Center; her own company Diverse Space Dance Theatre; and others, Her international work includes The Irish Youth Dance Festival and

IDOCDE in Amsterdam. Bravo is faculty of Ballet Austin's Academy and directs "Leaps and NO Bounds" and "Dance in the Classroom" programs in AISD schools. She also founded and runs Kinesis Dance Lab and directs a teacher training program in Rotterdam and Dublin. This is her first project with Mary Moody Northen Theatre.

SUSAN BRANCH TOWNE (Costume Designer) is an assistant professor of Theater at St. Edward's. She has designed previous Mary Moody Northen Theatre productions of Cabaret, The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui. She Loves Me, The Robber Bridegroom, Hamlet, Merrily We Roll Along, Museum, The Secret Garden, The Crucible, Carousel, The Life of Galileo, The Pajama Game, Ah! Wilderness! and Amadeus, Branch Towne's design résumé in Austin features more than 30 productions for ZACH Theatre, including A Christmas Carol, One Man Two Guvnors, Sophisticated Ladies, and The Who's Tommy, as well as work for Conspirare, Ballet Austin, and Austin Opera. KATHRYN EADER (Lighting Designer) has designed Cabaret, Mouthful, The Government Inspector, To Kill A Mockingbird, Hamlet, Merrily We Roll Along, Tartuffe, The Secret Garden, Under Construction, The Crucible, Eurydice and Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf? at Mary Moody Northen Theatre. In addition to her role as assistant professor of Theater Design at St. Edward's, Eader is the resident lighting designer for the Butler Opera Center at The University of Texas at Austin, where she has designed 16 productions including the world premieres of La Hija de Rappaccini and A View From the Bridge. For Austin Lyric Opera, she recently designed The Manchurian Candidate, Tosca and The Marriage of Figaro. After completing her undergraduate degree at The University of Texas at Austin, Eader earned her MFA in Lighting

JESSICA COLLEY-MITCHELL (Set Designer) is a set and costume designer from Austin, Texas. She holds degrees from The University of Texas at Austin and The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, is a Leadership

Austin alumna (best class ever!) and currently serves as vice chair of the Arts Commission.



DAVID M. LONG (Fight Director, Mary Moody Northen Theatre Artistic Director) is an actor, director and educator who has worked professionally throughout the U.S. and in Japan. Long has served as a

faculty member at Winthrop University in South Carolina and Portland State University in Oregon and currently serves as artistic director and associate professor of Theater Arts at St. Edward's University. Directing credits at Mary Moody Northen Theatre include Rhinoceros, The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui, Mr. Burns, a post-electric play (Austin Critics Table Award for Outstanding Direction), Love and Information, Tartuffe, Museum, Under Construction, The Further Adventures of Hedda Gabler (Austin Critics Table Award for Outstanding Comedy), the world premiere production of David Chamber's The Imaginary Invalid, On The Verge, bobrauschenbergamerica (Austin Critics Table Award for Outstanding Ensemble Performance). Cloud 9, Full Circle (Austin Critics Table Award for Best Comedy), Macbeth and Antigone. At MMNT, he has appeared as Neville Craven in The Secret Garden, John Proctor in The Crucible, Stone in City of Angels, Cyrano (Austin Critics Table Award for

Outstanding Acting in a Leading Role) in *Cyrano de Bergerac* and Leo Frank in *Parade*. Long is an active member in both Actors' Equity Association and the Screen Actors' Guild. He would like to thank his wife, Tracy, and daughters, Amelia and Alura, for their patience and loving support.

NAOMI IIZUKA (Playwright) has written numerous plays including 36 Views, Polaroid Stories, Anon(ymous), Language of Angels, Aloha, Say the Pretty Girls, Tattoo Girl, Skin, At the Vanishing Point, Concerning Strange Devices from the Distant West, 17 Reasons Why, Ghostwritten, Hamlet: Blood in the Brain (a collaboration with CalShakes and Campo Santo + Intersection for the Arts), 3 Truths (a collaboration with Cornerstone Theater Company). War of the Worlds (a collaboration with Anne Bogart and SITI Company), and Good Kids (the first play commissioned by the Big Ten Consortium's New Play Initiative).
