CHARLES DICKENS' A CHRISTMAS CAROL

Preface to A Christmas Carol

I have endeavored in this Ghostly little book, to raise the Ghost of an Idea, which shall not put my readers out of humour with themselves, with each other, with the season, or with me. May it haunt their house pleasantly, and no one wish to lay it.

Their faithful Friend and Servant, Charles Dickens, December 1843.

Charles Dickens was born in 1812. His childhood experiences would later be reflected in his novel David Copperfield (1849-50). His father, a government clerk, was imprisoned for debt. At the age of twelve, Charles was sent to work. He taught himself shorthand and became a reporter for the *Morning Chronicle*. He began *Oliver Twist* in 1837, followed by *Nicholas Nickleby* in 1838 and *The Old Curiosity Shop* in 1840. By the time he published *A Christmas Carol*, Charles Dickens was already a very popular novelist.

A Christmas Carol was written in 1843. It is the first of Dickens' Christmas Books that includes *The Chimes, The Cricket on the Hearth, The Battle of Life,* and *The Haunted Man.* The Christmas Books are not linked through subject matter or setting, but they do all contain a focus on the importance of family, and the ability of memory to affect beneficial change.

A Christmas Carol has retained its place as the most popular of the Christmas Books for over 150 years. There have been almost 30 film adaptations. The earliest surviving one is Scrooge, or Marley's Ghost (1901), a silent British version.

Charles Dickens abridged *A Christmas Carol* to streamline the story and make it appropriate for readings. Our version uses the text (almost entirely) from Charles Dickens' own abridged version of his tale.

A CHRISTMAS CAROL LEXICON

Carol: A song or ballad of joy celebrating the birth of Christ

Humbug: Nonsense

Parliament: The legislature of Great Britain

Workhouses: Union workhouses: home for the poor and destitute where people worked in exchange for room and board; often riddled

with disease and death

City of London: Business district of London

Knocker: A device, usually metal and ornamental, attached by a

hinge to a door, used for knocking

A dowerless girl: Dickens deleted the word "orphan" from this description. Apparently, Belle is in mourning due to the death of her parents who have left her nothing

Charwoman: A servant hired by the day to do odd housework

Old screw: Slang for a miser

Half a crown: Two shillings and six pence (an eighth of a British

pound in old currency)

Blithe: Happy

Next morning: St. Stephen's Day, called "Boxing Day" in England, when gratuities (or Christmas boxes) are given to those who have provided services during the year.

Smoking Bishop: A spicy punch made with port, similar to mulled wine (a popular tayern drink in the 18th century)
