



ASHLYN NICHOLS (Tree) is very excited to be back on the stage after taking a year off. For the past four years she has appeared on stage in shows such as Meet Me in St. Louis, Oliver, Cats, The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas, The Producers, and most recently Grease. Ashlyn also has danced since she was 2 years old.

She currently is taking classes, at her mothers sudio, The Georgetown Conservitory of Dance and at Austin Community College. Ashlyn would like to thank her family and friends for supporting her in everything she does.





CRAIG KANNE (Estragon) has recently appeared in "Sordid Lives" and "Murdered to Death" at Sam Bass Theatre. He has done many shows in Austin since moving there in 1980. The most recent being "Laughter on the 23rd Floor" at the City Theatre. Until the end of 2008, he worked for the City of Austin water department performing the "Dowser Dan" program at area elementary schools.

FRANK BENGE (Vladimir) was last seen here as Inspector Pratt in "Murdered to Death" and is directing our spring musical: "Fashion".

Frank has been twice nominated as Outstanding Lead Actor in a comedy by ACoT and twice nominated as Best Supporting Actor by the Austin Critic's Table. He has appeared in so many shows that he

He has appeared in so many shows that he has now officially lost count; however, some of his favorite roles, in addition to the aforementioned Mr. Pratt, include Sheridan Whiteside in "The Man Who Came to Dinner", Teddy Brewster in "Arsenic and Old Lace", Lord Goring in "An Ideal Husband", Sir in "The Roar of the Greasepaint" and Saunders in "Lend Me A Tenor". The last time he got to dabble in absurdist theatre was back in 1978 during his days as a member of Kansas City's Theatre Workshop troupe (now known as The Unicorn Theatre) when he had the lead in an original absurdist play: "The Swan Killers". In the words of Mr. Beckett: "How time files when one has fun!" Thanks to Ronni for asking me to do this role.





Ben Weaver (Lucky) This is Ben's second show here at SBCT. In 2009 he played the young Albert Einstein in our production of Steve Martin's "Picasso At The Lapin Agile". Ben started performing a few years back at Vive Les Arts in Killeen before taking a hiatus of several years to concentrate on personal and spiritual growth. However, when The Rapture failed to materialize (or rather, when he failed to dematerialize) he decided to resume his passion for pretending to be somebody else and has been performing in shows in and around Austin ever since. He played Edward Angkatel in Way-Off-Broadway Community Players production of Agatha Christie's "The Hollow". He played multiple characters in "My Bugatti Story" by Paul Ehrmann. January 2010 saw him in the role of Dr. Hans Posse "in Love Me" by Philip Kreyche. He also has one speaking film role to his credit which was delivered to, as it turns out, a former Mrs. Willie Nelson.

This devishly handsome young man has most recently been seen on The Georgetown Palace stage in "Annie", "Grease", and "The Producers". 



