To Kill a Mockingbird is one of the great American stories. With clear, simple strokes, it paints a moving portrait of a child's coming of age, small-town southern life in the Great Depression, and the lingering, poisonous shadows of slavery.

Justice is a fragile thing. Definitions of justice are as varied as the people who demand it. Although we have come a long way since 1935 in our attitudes and our understanding, it is a never-ending struggle that engages all our lives in one way or another.

To Kill a Mockingbird retains its power because it resonates so simply and clearly with our lives. Each of us has felt the hurt and confusion of discovering that the world is unjust. Each of us has been touched by watching someone brave enough to witness for the truth. And, hopefully, each of us has learned to walk around a bit in another person's shoes.

There are usually no simple answers to the hard questions. We hope that in our storytelling you will find avenues of discussion with your friends and your families. It is only with time and community that we can change, grow and contribute. We offer you, then, *To Kill a Mockingbird*.


