It's 2026 in "Texaco" - the ungoverned territory that used to be South Texas/La Frontera. This region was relinquished or sold to Mexico - depending on how you look at it. It is a lawless frontier, abandoned by longtime residents and used primarily as a drug trafficking virtual warehouse. A few stalwart and hardheaded residents remain, constantly embattled with the drug cartels, the military and the occasional interloper. With a nod to the past, and an eye to the future, Dos Pocitos is a comedy about this place, and the place it represents for all Latinos.

Raul Garza (playwright) is a creative writer and pop culture junkie. As a writer for Austin's Latino Comedy Project, Raul contributed to numerous stage and touring shows, including *Citizen Quien?* and *LCP Does Life*. Recently, Raul co wrote a full-length screenplay, *Digging Up Roots*. His first full-length play, *Fantasmaville*, received the 2007 National Latino Playwriting Award. When not writing plays, Raul serves as cofounder and creative director of TKO Advertising. *Sat Nam y'all!*

Estevan J. (Chuy) Zarate (director) is very excited to be working with Teatro Vivo once again. He is very pleased to see that the growth of this company over time has helped to establish Teatro Vivo as the premier producer of Latino theatre here in Austin. Some past productions/comedy troupes as a director include: *Keeping Track* and *Petra's Pecado* for Teatro Vivo; *Basement Refugees* for Teatro Humanidad; *The Mad Dog Blues* for One Theatre Co.; *Ray Prewitt's 4th Grade .Class* for the Velveeta Room.
