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Notes on the Play

All men by nature desire knowledge.

- Aristotle, Metaphysics

Aristotle

Greek philosopher and scientist. Born 384 BCE, died 322 BCE. Studied under the great philospher Plato. After Plato's death, Aristotle established his own school in Athens, The Lyceum, in 335 BCE. Over the next 12 years, he wrote treatises on subjects including the soul, physics, metaphysics, ethics and poetics. These treatises become the foundation for all subsequent scholarly debate and knowledge in these fields. Brecht developed his own dramaturgy in part as a reaction to concepts Aristotle introduced in *The Poetics* regarding the role of drama in society.

Ptolomey

Greek astronomer and geographer. Born around 85 in Egypt, died 165. Using Aristotle's assertion that the earth stands at the center of the universe and all other objects revolve around the earth, Ptolomy set out to create a mathematical decription of the universe. His theory stood for 1400 years.

Nicolaus Copernicus

Polish scholar, matematician and astronomer. 1473-1543.

In 1543 he published *De Revolutionibus Orbium Coelestium* (*On the Revolution of The Celestial Spheres*), which set out a fully predictive mathematical model of a heliocentric solar system, in which all planets revolve around the sun, and all the bodies of the universe move in circular motions. The book was a critical influence on the European Scientific Revolution.

Galileo Galilei

Mathematician and astronomer. Born February 15, 1564, in Pisa; died in 1642 outside of Florence. Galileo had three children by Marina Gamba, whom he never maried. The oldest was his daughter Virginia, who, along with her sister Livia, entered a convent in 1614. Virginia was to be a great supporter of her father, and they maintained an active correspondence (see Sobel, Dava. *Galileo's Daughter: A Historical Memoir of Science, Faith and Love.* New York: Walker and Company, 1999).

Galileo's contributions to science include:

- Invented the pulse meter while a student at the University of Pisa later was the foundation for the mechanism used in the pendulum clock.
- Contributed research on the Law of Falling Bodies, challenging the Aristotelian view that heavy objects fall faster than light ones.
- Adapted and vastly improved a telescope first created in Holland by Dutch spectacle maker Hans Lippershey. Galileo increased its power from three to 30 times, creating the first astronomical telescope.
- Using his new telescope, discoved the moon had mountains and valleys and was not a smooth orb as Aristotle had suggested.
- Also with the telescope, over the course of several days in January of 1610, discovered the moons of Jupiter. This discovery called into question the Ptolomeic theory of the universe which was based on the teaching of Aristotle.

Galileo's story has been held up as a classic illustration of the long history of disputes between science and the church. In this sense, history has cast a poor light on the Italian scientist, for Galileo never presumed a conflict between religion and science — not even with regard to his defense of the Copernican system. He felt strongly that one could be religious and a scientist, and that God made the world and gave man the capacity to understand and explore it. He believed that proof could sway rational men to accept radical ideas.

For Brecht, writing in 1938, the choice to examine Galileo's life was an exercise in examining abuse of political power in many forms — Naziism, fascism and Stalinism, among others. As he revised the play several times between 1938 and 1947, it also took on the added role of a message against providing scientific progress to the wrong hands — his chilling call in response to the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Is also served as a manifesto for his Marxist beliefs. To achieve this end, Brecht took liberties with historical fact.

This is not to say that the Roman Catholic church functions solely as a metaphor in this play. The church in Galileo's time was certainly rife with abuses, and the Holy Inquisition, which ultimately squelched his voice, committed horrible acts in the name of preventing or obsuring any threats to an already shaky Church system. In 1600, only nine years before Galileo turned his telescope to the skies, philosopher, mathematician and astronomer Giaordano Bruno was burnt alive at the stake because he supported the Copernican heliocentric view that the earth revolved around the sun.

Galileo and Pope Urban VIII

In 1632 Galileo's friend Cardinal Maffeo Barberini became Pope Urban VIII. Barberini was an open-minded man of science and culture and an admirer of Galileo. Soon after the Pope's inauguration, Galileo traveled to Rome to ask Barberini's permission to publish his Copernican theory. The Pope agreed, as long as Galileo published his theory as a hypothesis and not as fact. Galileo finished his masterpiece, *Dialogue Concerning the Two Chief World Systems*, on Christmas 1629. Concerned that his book reach a wide audience, Galileo wrote in Italian, not Latin, and used the entertaining, popular style of a dialogue between three characters, Salviati (Galileo's alter ego), Sagredo (a referee), and Simplicio (Aristotle's advocate). In order to obtain the approval of the church, Galileo was obliged to close the dialogue with a statement by Urban VIII. In his book, Galileo put the views of the Pope into the mouth of the fool, Simplicio, who represented the Aristotelian view of the universe sanctioned by the church. Galileo's old friend viewed his role as a comic foil in the *Dialogue* as an impertinence and a grievous insult. Subsequently Barbarini sanctioned Galileo's heresy trial by the Holy Inquisition in 1633.

Only in1992 did a Papal Commission finally reconsider the church's handling of the Galileo affair. Pope John Paul II expressed formal regret that the Galileo affair had contributed to a tragic and mutual misunderstanding between religion and science. Nearly 400 years later, the debate continues in various forms — as evidence by the push in Texas for a more God-centered social studies curriculum, or a Kansas decree that creationism must be taught in public schools, or the ongoing political challenges to stem cell research. The effect is staggering: According to researcher Chris Mahoney, in a recent study only half of the adult populace knows the earth orbits the sun once per year.

The Company

DAVID STAHL (Galileo Galilei) is a pro-



fessional actor living and working in Austin. He received his BFA from Southwestern University in Georgetown and his MFA from the University of Texas at Austin. He is a member of the Board

of Directors and Acting Company of Austin Playhouse where he has played roles such as David Frost in Frost/Nixon, Phillipe in Heroes, Nixon in The Dead Presidents Club, Henry in Travesties, Bernard in Arcadia, Werner Heisenberg in Copenhagen, Elliot in Private Lives, Bernard in House and Garden, Sir Thomas More in A Man For All Seasons, Felix in The Odd Couple, and Henry Drummond in Inherit the Wind among others. He has also appeared in The Glass Menagerie, Nightswim, A Christmas Carol, Mrs. Warren's Profession, Art, Prides Crossing, Henry V, Richard III, and The Merry Wives of Windsor, among others. David toured with the Greater Tuna Company's production of The Foreigner as Jaston Williams' understudy and as a dresser for A Tuna Christmas. BERTOLT BRECHT (Playwright) was



born in Augsburg, Germany in 1898. He studied philosophy and medicine at the University of Munich before being drafted as medical orderly during the First World War. He returned to his

studies after the war but became gradually more interested in literature and theater His first play, *Baal*, was produced in 1922. This was followed by *Drums in the Night*, *Jungle of the Cities* (1923) and *A Man's a Man* (1926). In 1927 Brecht collaborated with the composer Kurt Weill to produce the musical play, *The Little Mahagonny*.

They then produced The Threepenny Opera together. In 1930 he collaborated with composer Hanns Eisner on The Measure Taken. Brecht's plays reflected a strong Marxist interpretation of society, and when Adolf Hitler gained power in 1933, Brecht was forced to flee from Germany. While living in exile, he wrote anti-Nazi plays such as The Roundheads and The Peakheads and Fear and Misery of the Third Reich. These were followed by Galileo (1939, revised in 1945), Mother Courage and Her Children (1939), The Good Person of Szechuan (1941), The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui (1941) and The Caucausian Chalk Circle (1943). Still in exile, Brecht arrived in the United States in 1941 and settled in Hollywood. There he contributed to writing the film, Hangman Also Die (1943). In 1947, under investigation by the U.S. House of Un-American Activities Committee (HUAC) as a possible communist, Brecht left America for East Germany. In 1949 he founded the Berliner Ensemble which became the country's most famous theater company. Brecht wrote only one new play, The Days of the Commune (1949) thereafter. He was in rehearsal for a German production of The Life of Glaileo when he died on August 14, 1956.

DAVID HARE (Playwright), British actor, director and playwright David Hare was born in 1947 in West Sussex, England, A Cambridge graduate, Hare co-founded Portable Theatre Company. His first play, Slag, was produced in London in 1970 at the Hampstead Theatre Club. He served as Resident Dramatist at the Royal Court Theatre in London in 1970-1971 and Resident Dramatist at the Nottingham Playhouse in 1973. In 1975, Hare co-founded Joint Stock Theatre Group with David Aukin and Max Stafford-Clark. In 1977 he held a U.S./ U.K. Bicentennial Fellowship. Hare's plays include Knuckle (1974), Fanshen (1975), Plenty (1978), Pravda: A Fleet Street Comedy (1985), The Secret Rapture (1988), the trilogy Racing Demon (1990), Murmuring Judges (1991) and The Absence of War (1993),

Skylight (1995), Amy's View (1997), and The Judas Kiss (1998). He has also adapted Chekhov's Platonov and Ivanov. Schnitzler's La Ronde (The Blue Room), and Brecht's Mother Courage and Her Children for the theatre. More recent plays include My Zinc Bed, first staged at the Royal Court Theater, London, in September 2000, and The Breath of Life (2002). The Permanent Way (2003) opened at the Royal National Theatre in January 2004. His play, Stuff Happens (2005), was premiered at the National in 2005. In addition to theater, Hare has a written and directed for film. His book. Obedience, Struggle and Revolt (2005), is a collection of lectures about politics and art. His most recent plays are The Vertical Hour (2006) and Gethsemane (2008), and the screenplay for the film of The Corrections, based on the novel by Jonathan Franzen. Hare was knighted in 1998 and is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature. He currently resides in London. His papers were acquired by the Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center at The University of Texas at Austin in 1993.

MICHELLE S. POLGAR (Director. MMNT Managing Director) returns to the director's chair after directing Cyrano de Bergerac for MMNT last season (Austin Critics' Table Award for Outstanding Direction, Outstanding Production of a Drama). Local directing credits include A Christmas Carol, The Woman In Black (Austin Critics' Table nomination), Proof and The Glass Menagerie (Austin Critics' Table nomination) for the State Theatre and Sherlock Holmes for The Public Domain. Michelle holds theatrical credits spanning more than 20 years in theatrical production and management from theaters including Children's Theatre of Charlotte, CPCC Summer Theatre, The Cleveland Playhouse, The State Theatre, Austin Shakespeare, UT-Austin and others. Michelle holds an MA from the University of Texas, a BA from the University of North Carolina and attended the North Carolina School of the Arts.


