Measure for Measure Backstory:

In 1920's Savannah, Georgia, Duke Vincentio becomes fed up with the corruption and licentiousness that his lax governmental policies have allowed to run rampant. Fearing that it has become too late for him to start enforcing laws the people have virtually ignored for nineteen years, the Duke, a man who has always valued privacy and "the life removed," decides to leave Savannah in the care of Angelo, his deputy. Angelo, known for his strict interpretations of the law and his own moral righteousness, decides to make an example of a young man named Claudio who has impregnated his lover out of wedlock. Claudio sends to his sister, Isabella, who is shortly to become a nun, to plead for his life to Angelo.

A Note from the Director

Religion influencing government laws again personal interactions, particularly in sexual matters, was alive during Shakespeare's own time; not unlike the 20th Century which is riddled with laws in the U.S. against pre-marital sex and adultery. Religion's political power is boldly reasserting itself in the 21st Century, so that the "Measure for Measure" crackdown on sexual freedom unfortunately doesn't seem so far away. Today, government control over private morality is not limited to abortion or homosexual marriage – for instance, abstinence-training in the schools and social service programs suggests that conservative sexual restrictions may not be so far-fetched as many might suppose.

NOTES ON THE PRODUCTION

Sickness and Corruption in Measure for Measure

The world of Measure for Measure is a dirty and diseased one, in which, as the Duke argues, "evil deeds have their permissive pass/And not the punishment." Shakespeare represents this corruption in the text through a series of striking and visceral references to venereal disease and the destruction of the body through an excess of physical indulgence. At the heart of this depravity is Mistress Overdone's brothel, where Lucio has "purchased many diseases" including the "French crown" of syphilis, and where the Mistress herself is often "in the tub," presumably soaking in mercury to relieve her own symptoms. Even the sciatica Shakespeare ascribes to Overdone was often associated with disease of a more sinister nature. One of the central paradoxes of the play is Shakespeare's fascination with what Angelo refers to as "sweet uncleanness," i.e. the alluring temptation of sexual encounters despite their sometimes deadly consequences.

GLOSSARY

Word/Text	Definition/Meaning
Commissions	official orders, in this case from the Duke to Angelo and Escalus as he leaves charge of Savannah to them.
French crown	a reference to syphilis, which was known in the Renaissance as the French disease
Sciatica	a disease often associated with prostitutes. Pain in the sciatic nerve can also be connected with venereal disease, particularly syphilis
Houses of resort	brothels. Sometimes simply referred to as "houses."
Tapster	a bartender. In this case, also a pimp, and one who helps to run the brothel in which the bar is located.
Stewed Prunes (dish)	Another way to disguise the business of a brothel was to serve small food dishes, particularly stewed prunes. There is also a play in the stewed prunes scene on the term "dish" for a loose woman.
Provost	Here, the man who runs the prison. Has come into modern usage connected to universities rather than prisons.
Calumny	a false statement intentionally made to injure the reputation of another
Durance	restraint or imprisonment. Claudio's fear of "perpetual durance" is a reference to a life sentence in prison
Bawd	Pimp
The Block	lower class characters in Shakespeare's time (like Barnardine) would have been executed by hanging. Upper class characters like Claudio would have had their heads chopped off, as it was thought to be a less painful and demeaning method of execution.
