
The Company continued

a note from our author

"This is an Author's note. No! This is an author's **WARNING** to all producers, directors, actors, and theatrical people in general. Do not try to produce this play! It will drive you crazy and you'll end up curled in a ball in a corner masturbating like an uptight gorilla. If you do try to produce this play and this is the result, don't worry, it's not your fault. It's mine. I have written an unproducable play. Why you may ask. Well, because I wanted to. It's been a yearlong exercise in self indulgence to grotesque proportions. If you think this Author's note is self indulgent, you ain't seen nothin yet! I'll walk you through the history of all this shit and once we're through it hopefully I will have convinced you that your time would be better spent on something, no, **ANYTHING ELSE**.

The Play's origin lies in a play by Harold Pintar. Don't ask me the name of the play. I don't know it. I lost the book about ten pages in and never bothered to find it again. I read part of one once and it certainly changed my life. Take care now."
