George Bernard Shaw

George Bernard Shaw (playwright) was born in Dublin, Ireland in 1856. He moved to London as a young man and worked as a music critic, novelist, and drama critic before turning his attention to playwriting.

Shaw had a prolific career as a playwright, publishing over fifty plays in his lifetime. His first successful play, *Candida*, was produced in 1898. He followed it with a series of popular comedydramas, including *Arms and the Man, Caesar and Cleopatra, Man and Superman, Major Barbara, Misalliance,* and *Pygmalion*. After World War I, Shaw wrote the more serious dramas *Heartbreak House* and *Saint Joan*.

Shaw was a member of the Fabian Society, a non-revolutionary socialist organization, as well as a staunch pacifist. His plays often promote freethinking, socialist and feminist ideals.

His wit can perhaps be summed up with a line from his play *John Bull's Other Island:* "My way of joking is to tell the truth. It is the funniest joke in the world."

Shaw won the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1925 and an Academy Award for adapting his play, *Pygmalion*, to the screen in 1938. He is the only person to ever win both awards. Shaw died in 1950, at the age of 94, due to a fall from a ladder.

Misalliance, which takes place over the course of a single afternoon at an English country estate, deals primarily with how the mating game was played in Edwardian England. It also tackles several of Shaw's favorite subjects including feminism, parents vs. children, old vs. new, the decline of the aristocracy, and the education and rise of the working class.

COMPANY BIOGRAPHIES

Don Toner (Producing Artistic Director) is celebrating fifty years in professional theatre with the tenth anniversary season of Austin Playhouse. He founded Austin Playhouse in 2000. Before that he was Producing Artistic Director of the State Theater Company/Live Oak Theatre for thirteen years. Prior to coming to Austin he was Associate Producer for the inaugural season of the Los Angeles Theatre Center, Associate Producer/Director of the Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park for three seasons, and he founded Theatre Center of Mississippi; the state's first Equity theatre. He has also produced and directed at New Stage Theatre, Bucks County Playhouse, Theatre Midland and Theatre Four in New York City. For Austin Playhouse he has produced and directed The Mousetrap, Frost/Nixon, The Fantasticks, A Flea in Her Ear. Dancing at Lughnasa. Amadeus, A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, Blithe Spirit, Stones in His Pockets, Les Liaisons Dangereuses, Don't Dress for Dinner, Inherit the Wind, The Threepenny Opera, Steel Magnolias, An Ideal Husband, The Night Hank Williams Died, The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas, The Odd Couple, House, A Man for All Seasons, The Mystery of Edwin Drood, Rumors, Enchanted April, Cat on a Hot Tin Roof. The Underpants, Kiss Me Kate, Private Lives, Travesties, The Dead Presidents' Club, Damn Yankees, A Christmas Carol, Copenhagen, The Man Who Came to Dinner, Blues in the Night, The Seagull, Arcadia, Mahalia, and Light Up the Sky. He has appeared in Austin Playhouse productions of Heroes, Afterplay and The Threepenny Opera.

Barry Miller (Stage Manager) is a member of the Austin Playhouse Acting Company where he has appeared in Amadeus, Inherit the Wind, A Man for All Seasons. The Merry Wives of Windsor, A Christmas Carol and stage managed many productions including Frost/Nixon, The Fantasticks, Dancing at Lughnasa, A Funny....Forum, Les Liaisons Dangereuses, Inherit the Wind. An Ideal Husband, The Night Hank Williams Died, House, Enchanted April, Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, Kiss Me Kate, Travesties, The Dead Presidents' Club. Copenhagen and Arcadia. He was a company member of State Theater Company for 13 years where he performed in and stage managed 31 productions. He is also a member of the Hyde Park Theater Company. A twenty-nine year veteran of the Austin Public Library, he holds masters degrees from the University of Michigan and St. Edward's University.

Buffy Manners (Costume Designer) has designed A Flea in Her Ear. Dancing at Lughnasa, Sylvia, Blithe Spirit, Les Liaisons Dangereuses, The Threepenny Opera, An Ideal Husband, A Man for All Seasons, Enchanted April, A Texas Romance, Cat on a Hot Tin Roof. Travesties, The Fantasticks, The Seagull, and The Merry Wives of Windsor (a coproduction with Austin Shakespeare Festival) for Austin Playhouse. She designed all shows under the direction of Don Toner at the State Theatre. She has been nominated for several B. Iden Payne Awards for her work. She has also been nominated for Austin Critics Table Awards for her costume designs for An Ideal Husband, A Macbeth, The Merry Wives of Windsor, Henry V, and Mrs. Warren's Profession. Before getting

involved in theatre, Ms Manners started her costume design career in the dance world with Austin Ballet Theatre in the days when they performed at the Armadillo World Headquarters. She is a regular designer for Tapestry Dance Company productions.

Don Day (Lighting Designer) has been designing professionally for over 30 years winning both Austin Circle of Theatre and Austin Critics' Table awards for his work. Don designed light for the Austin Playhouse productions of The Turn of the Screw, Frost/Nixon, The Fantasticks, A Flea in Her Ear, Age of Arousal, Dancing at Lughnasa, It's a Wonderful Life, Sylvia, Dug Up, Amadeus, A Funny...Forum, Blithe Spirit, Speed the Plow, Les Liaisons Dangereuses. Stones in His Pockets. Don't Dress for Dinner, Inherit the Wind, Exits and Entrances, Women Who Steal, The Threepenny Opera. An Ideal Husband, The Night Hank Williams Died, The Dead Presidents' Club, The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas. The Odd Couple and House. He is currently working with students as Technical Director at Southwestern University in Georgetown. Don holds an MFA from the University Of Texas.

Jessica Colley-Mitchell (Set Designer) recently designed the sets for Austin Playhouse's productions of *The Mousetrap* and *A Flea in Her Ear*. She is a 2008 graduate of Southwestern University, where she focused on set and costume design. Recent credits include *SubUrbia, The House of Bernarda Alba* (assistant designer), and *Dido and Aeneas* at Southwestern, as well as scenic artist for the 2007 Zilker Summer Musical, *My Favorite Year*. Costume credits include work for the Lone Star Lyric Opera in Houston, *The Rocky*

Horror Picture Show (cutter/draper) and Seussical: The Musical, both at Southwestern. She has also worked on costumes for Caucasian Chalk Circle, Annie Get Your Gun, and The Waiting Room for the 2008-2009 season at Pflugerville High School.

The Gunn Brothers (Sound Designers) Gordon and Jimy have been have been recognized many times over with B. Iden Payne and Critics' Table awards and nominations. They have worked with most of the theatres in Austin; they were the sound designers in residence at Capital City Playhouse for the majority of its run, and they worked on some 20 shows at the State Theatre. Previous shows with Austin Playhouse include The Mousetrap, Frost/Nixon, A Flea in Her Ear, Dancing at Lughnasa, It's a Wonderful Life, Sylvia, Dug Up, Amadeus, Speed the Plow, Blithe Spirit, Women Who Steal, Moonlight and Magnolias, Steel Magnolias, The Kingfish, The Night Hank Williams Died, The Man Who Came to Dinner, The Merry Wives of Windsor, Copenhagen, The Seagull, Blues in the Night, and Arcadia.

Jennifer Singletary (Properties Designer) has been the properties designer for the Austin Playhouse productions of The Mousetrap, A Flea in Her Ear, The Fantasticks, Dancing at Lughnasa, Sylvia, Amadeus, Blithe Spirit, Les Liaisons Dangereuses, Inherit the Wind, The Threepenny Opera, Steel Magnolias, An Ideal Husband, and The Night Hank Williams Died. She has worked in the art department for various films, commercials, and videos. She has also worked in technical theatre at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill and for the AnimaDance Company in North Carolina.

Brock England (Gunner) has been active in Austin theater for the past five years. He is making his debut here at the Austin Playhouse with Misalliance. He has performed with a Chick and a Dude Productions (Stall Graffiti ATX), The Bedlam Faction (Love's Labour's Lost, Reefer Madness, and Brats of Clarence), Shrewd Productions (Trash Can Anthems and Io: A Myth About You), Loaded Gun Theory (I Am Alpha), and the Scottish Rite Theatre (Twelfth Night and As You Like It) among many others.

Jason Newman (Joey Percival) makes his Austin Playhouse debut in Misalliance. Since then he has stayed busy in Austin Theatre with parts such as Rockabilly Boy in Salvage Vanguard Theatre's AmericaMisift, and Mike in Tongue and Groove Theatre's Bomb Shelter. Bryan has also done extensive sound design work and stage management for numerous Austin groups including DA! Iden Payne Award), The Dead Presidents' Club (Critics Table and B. Iden Payne Award), The Merry Wives of Windsor, Copenhagen, The Man Who Came to Dinner, The Seagull, and Arcadia. He appeared in the State Theatre Company productions of Nightswim and The Glass Menagerie. performances Other include Shakespeare's Richard III (2002 B. Michael Stuart (Lord Summerhays) is a member of the Austin Playhouse Acting Company, Austin Playhouse productions include The Mousetrap, Frost/Nixon, The Fantasticks, Heroes, It's a Wonderful Life: A Live Radio Play, A Funny...Forum, Stones in His Pockets, Inherit the Wind, The Threepenny Opera, Moonlight and Magnolias, An Ideal Husband, The Night Hank Williams Died, The Odd Couple, House and Garden, The Mystery of Edwin Drood, Rumors, Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, Kiss Me Kate, Travesties, and The Dead Presidents' Club.
