### A Word From the Homeowners

Dear Muses Audience

Welcome to our home! From the moment we first stepped through the doorway of this historic house just over a year ago, we could feel that it was alive with stories and memories, and that it had always been well-loved. We put everything on the line to buy the place, and when we were lucky enough to make it our home, we had visions of adding memories to its walls by filling it with friends and family every chance we got. So when we found out that the vestige group was looking for a location for their annual Muses: Memories of a House production, we jumped at the chance to add another vibrant story to our house's history.

We are the fifth owners of this amazing house. The original owners built the house in 1922, about a block south of its current location. Sitting on farmland, the big white house was the only structure on many acres. The same family occupied the house in 1958 when south Austin began to develop. At that time they sold off most of the land, but the house meant so much to them that they carved out the current lot and moved the house down the block to where it now stands. (Quite a feat for 1958!) When they moved the house, both chimneys broke, and the grand front porch fell off and was replaced with simple concrete steps.

When the original owners died, their adult son and daughter inherited the house and turned it into an upstairs/downstairs duplex so they could both remain here. Hence the two front doors, the two back entrances, and the extra upstairs kitchen. Later they sold the house to a family whose college-age son lived here with several wild and rowdy roommates. (Apparently, even the mailman used to party here.)

About three years ago, a couple with vision bought the house and began to renovate it. The original floors had already been restored, and the couple diligently removed unsightly asbestos siding that had been added sometime along the way, restored the stunning front porch, and revealed original beadboard on the library ceiling. Unfortunately for them, circumstances created the unforeseen need to sell the house, and we were fortunate enough to find it at just the right time.

We fell in love with the place's history, its happy feel, the funkiness of its location amid all ages and flavors of homes, and of course its rooftop widow's walk. We feel privileged to have the opportunity to be part of south Austin's history by getting to live here. Thanks a lot for sharing in its stories. And have fun!

When we began our first house project several years ago at Helen Robert's home, we had no idea what we would be embarking on. A bunch of actors, a zillion pieces, a beautiful home filled with audience members yearning for something different. It was our second show as a company, and we had no idea how it would be received. The overwhelming response amazed us. Our next Muses production, at the wonderful artistic home of Bobby Pearl, and the following year at the incredible house of Pam and Phil Friday brought even more amazement. It was clear we had begun a tradition.

In our original mission statement, written in one of our first production meetings over four years ago, we stated that we wanted to "push theatre back into the mainstream, making it just as desirable for the everyday person to pop into a play rather then see a movie." With the creation of Muses, we have accomplished this goal.

We will continue to make our Muses project an annual tradition. We want to go as many places as we can in Austin, create both a new work of art, and a new community of theatre goers.

This year we are doing something very special. In response to audience requests we have added a new component to Muses. Instead of telling 10 separate stories, we gave our Muses IV playwrights a specific family to draw from. What you have this year are ten moments from this family's life. Meet Denise, Winston, Shawn, Nora and Meghan and the people in their lives. See them at their highest moments and their lowest- and see Muses, for the first time ever, not only tell the story of one house, but this time, one family.

Thanks to the homeowners, Candyce Ossefort-Russell and Rod Russell,for inspiring us with their lovely home (and their family for sharing it with us,) and the 8 playwrights,16 actors, 5 directors and several company members who worked so hard to make this possible.

So come, schmooze, wonder, delight, have a drink, mingle with the actors...allow the theatrical wall to dissolve. Actually experience theatre instead of simply watching it.

Become a character yourself without even knowing it.

This house has a story to tell, I hope you are listening.

Aside from acting, Jen is a model, director & sound designer and has designed such shows as The Heidi Chronicles, Stop Kiss, Brilliant Traces, Lion in the Streets, The Laramie Project and more.
