In Austin Vincent was a Best of the Fest performer in the annual Frontera Fest and has worked on the films A Perfect World and Spy Kids II. In the Actors and Theatre Arts Guild of Sun City, he has played Big Ed McKeever in The Solid Gold Cadillac by George Kaufman, Billy Fox in Neil Simon's London Suite, and Henry "in Funny Money by Ray Cooney. Dave

has also played comedy skits in the annual Sun City Follies.



Joe Penrod (Oscar Madison) most recently appeared on the Palace stage as Dr. Philip Gottschall in God's Man in Texas. Over the past two seasons, he has performed in a number of Pigea productions, including 1776 (John Adams), Jesus Christ Superstar (Pilate), and A Funny Thing Happened on the

Way to the Forum (Senex). In the Austin area, he was featured in North by Northwest Theatre's production of I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change and Golf: The Musical at Tex-Arts. Other roles include Don Quixote in Man of La Mancha, the title role in Sweeney Todd, King Arthur in Camelot, Serge in Art, Roma in Glengarry Glen Ross, and Salieri in Amadeus. Joe has appeared at the Berkshire Music Festival at Tanglewood, Aspen Music Festival, and the New England Bach Festival, and he has performed with the Boston Symphony, Sarasota Opera, and Lake George Opera Festival. In addition, Joe is an accomplished recitalist, having made his New York recital debut at Carnegie Recital Hall as a winner of the East & West Artists Competition. He was a prize winner in the International American Music Competition at Carnegie Hall.

PRODUCTION TEAM BIOS

Mary Ellen Butler (Artistic Director) took on her role at The Palace in mid-2004, but her affiliation with the Palace began in 2002 when she directed several shows. As Artistic Director, she produces the season and directs many shows, the most recent musical being Little Shop of Horrors and non-musical, God's Man In Texas. Other musicals she has directed include the Central Texas premiers of The Producers and Disney's Beauty and the Beast (Fall 2005); Guys & Dolls; Hello, Dolly!; Meet Me In St. Louis; Oliver!; A Christmas Carol: and The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas. Mary Ellen is also in charge of the year-round Theatrical Workshops for Children and Teens.

Ron Watson (Director) has been a frequent director for the Palace since 1999. Some of his favorite productions include Grease, Nunsense, A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, 1776, A Few Good Men, and Noises Off. Ron has also served as the Technical Director for the Palace since midway through the 2005-2006 season. Ron occasionally appears in some of the shows as well, most recently as the side-stepping Governor in The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas. Ron holds a BFA in Directing from SWTSU (now Texas State). He worked for several years as a Stage Manager for the State Theater Company and was the Production Stage Manager for the Austin Shakespeare Festival for three seasons. Ron thanks his lovely and incredibly talented wife, Samantha, for her love and support while he continues to pursue his passion for theater.

Faith Castaneda (Stage Manager) is in her 2nd season at The Palace, and feels very welcomed by this talented community. Faith's BFA in Theatre from Tarleton State University has been so useful in Georgetown and she's loved every minute of it. Most recently at the Palace, she stage managed Grease!
