

PROGRAM NOTE

In 1935, Sidney Kingsley's play *Dead End* premiered on Broadway starring young men who would later come to be known as *The Dead End Kids*. The play was so successful, a movie of the same

name was produced in 1937 starring Humphrey Bogart. That film spurred many movies thereafter, all centering on the famed "ruffians with short-tempers ... hearts of gold." The phrase The Dead End Kids, although hard to stomach,



came from an actual, non-metaphorical, dead end. In the slums of New York, the upper class began building luxurious apartments along the East River. The only thing that separated the opulence of the upper class and the tenements of the lower was the East River itself. More specifically, a dock that went right into the water.

Though originally threatening and menacing young tyrants, as the years passed the *The Dead End Kids* transitioned to more laughable subject matter. The pack ended their 89-film career as comedic shadows of their former, troubled selves. The actual Dead End was the corner of East 53rd Street and the East River. But that's no longer there. What remains is the image of a divide, and the haunting thought that the road we are already on is one that we cannot get off.

Orphans is the story of two boys in need of purpose and some real encouragement. It's a story often told, and sadly less often resolved. What happens when we don't have something to live for, or someone to love us? Kessler mirrors much of Kingsley's work studying human nature victim to the circumstances of life, environmental and hereditary. He encourages us to see the Dead End not as a literal dead end, but as a slice of life that breathes reality through the cracks and splinters of poverty and scarcity.

Lyle Kessler (Playwright) is a Philadelphia-born actor, playwright and director in the N.Y. and L.A. theatre scene. Kessler served as a professor at Loyola Marymount School of Film and Television, and studied acting with Lee Strasberg. Actress Margaret Ladd and Kessler founded the Los Angeles-based Imagination Workshop, which enables theatre artists to craft original theatrical pieces for at-risk students, veterans, and psychiatric hospital patients. Mr. Kessler's most successful play, *Orphans*, premiered at the L.A. Matrix Theatre in 1983, and then in both N.Y. and Chicago with Steppenwolf Theatre Co. In 2013, *Orphans* was finally brought to Broadway at the Schoenfeld Theatre, directed by Daniel Sullivan.

Michael Stuart (Harold) is pleased to be part of the Street Corner Arts Sidewalk Series premiere. He has previously appeared with SCA as Andrei in A Walk in the Woods and Fatt/Fayette/Grady in Waiting for Lefty. Other recent appearances include One Man Two Guvners at Zach Theatre The Drawer Boy for Hyde Park Theatre; Hughie and Krapp's Last Tape for Actors Theatre Austin . As a company member at the Austin Playhouse since 2004 he has been involved in over 30 productions. Most recently as Uncle Willie in The Philadelphia Story an Tor, the "very nice hit-man", in The Norwegians and Prof. Walling in The Explorers Club (starring Aaron Johnson!!) He is probably best remembered by Playhouse fans as LBJ in The Dead Presidents Club. Michael has also directed for many theatres in Austin. This production of Orphans has brought back many fond memories of a production he directed some 20 years ago starring Travis Dean, Kenneth Wayne Bradley and Damian Gillen at Hyde Park Theatre. AEA.
