
teacher in Austin ISD. Last year she co-directed with Crystal D. Paull The Davis Players in *Kid Frankenstein* at Davis Elementary School.

Play. He won the 1988 Academy Award for Best Original Screenplay for his film *Moonstruck*. He is the author of more than 23 plays, which have been translated and performed around the world.

#### Director's Notes

After reading *Outside Mullingar*, it was evident to me that playwright John Patrick Shanley was writing this play to celebrate—his rich Irish family heritage, death, life, love and the natural cycle of things controlling it all. The play also explores the very human ritual of one generation passing along to the next. Shanley's celebrations—although being authentically Irish—are universal ones and quite familiar to us all. They are natural, organic and lyrical. As a director, I tend to be drawn to the truth and musicality of a writer's story. These themes I think, along with his deeply realized and funny characters, have drawn me to the story of *Outside Mullingar*. I feel that our Austin audiences may also be lured to celebrate along with Mr. Shanley and his friends Tony, Aoife, Rosemary and Anthony.

# From the Playwright

Q: What was your inspiration for Outside Mullingar?

A: I started to go back to Ireland with my father when he got older and was uncertain about driving. I spent a lot of time with my Irish family, who were both incredibly eloquent and very funny, and moving in the sense that they'd grown up in a very pastoral setting, literally shepherds, and had a point of view and a grounding in relationship to their humanity that I found deeply compelling. I definitely felt more at home there than I have in the Bronx. My own personality and proclivities and tastes made more sense to me in Ireland than they did in America. I wrote this play as much to appreciate and keep alive what I had learned there and the delights that I had found there as anything else.
