A few words on A Raisin in the Sun

When it was first produced in 1959, *Raisin* was awarded the New York Drama Critics Circle Award and hailed as a watershed in American drama. Not only was it a pioneering work by an African-American playwright – Lorraine Hansberry's play was also a radically new representation of black life, one that was resolutely authentic, fiercely unsentimental, and unflinching in its vision of what happens to people whose dreams are constantly deferred.

Hansberry drew from an incident in her own childhood that profoundly affected her family's life. In defiance of real estate contracts of that era that barred blacks from certain neighborhoods, her father moved his family to an all-white area. Mobs gathered outside the new home, and 8-year-old Lorraine was almost struck by a brick hurled through a window. The family was finally evicted but Carl Hansberry and NAACP lawyers fought the state court decision all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court, ultimately winning a landmark decision prohibiting restrictive housing. Hansberry would later write "it will help a lot of people understand that we have among our downtrodden ranks people who are the very essence of human dignity. That is what – after all the laughter and the tears – the play is supposed to say."

In her portrait of an embattled Chicago Family, Hansberry anticipated issues that range from generational clashes to the civil rights and women's movements. She also posed the essential questions – about identity, justice, and moral responsibility – at the heart of these great struggles. The result is a work that captivated audiences from every walk of life and has become a classic of American drama.

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
