DIRECTOR'S NOTE

"Christ, a Rhinoceros!"

With nationalist rhetoric and accusations of fascism and "fake news" permeating the airwayes, we are now able to examine Eugène Ionesco's absurdist play, Rhinoceros, through a modern lens, Originally written in 1959, this satirical play, inspired by the Nazi occupation of France from 1940-1944, explores our willingness to accept and conform despite the social and moral consequences.

lonesco, a champion of the absurdist theatre movement of the late 1950s, presents the audience with an extraordinary circumstance balanced with characters that are purposefully ordinary. In this hysterical and often painful examination of the human condition, this group of citizens speak in clichés and accept ridiculous and outrageous logic to explain their plight. Yet, it is our apathetic and self-effacing protagonist whose journey is one of moral stance.

Ultimately, this is a play of transformation: both physical and psychological. It is the transformation from resistance to acceptance and from apathy to action. As we struggle as a nation with our current social and political debates, it is important to identify and illuminate these "transformations" in order not to succumb to a transformation of humanity.

Tolaro has been a member of Actors Equity Association for 35 years, and he has been a member of the Menopause the Musical national companies for four years. A director, actor and stage manager. Tolaro holds an MFA in Theatre from Trinity University in San Antonio, co-founded of the Callier Theatre of the Deaf in Dallas, and served as artistic director of the Fairmount Theatre of the Deaf at the Cleveland Play House in Ohio. He most recently stage managed Million Dollar Quartet at the Totem Pole Playhouse in Pennsylvania. Tolaro is currently adjunct professor of Stage Management at St. Edward's University.

EUGÈNE IONESCO (*Playwright*) published *Rhinocéros*, his most popular play, in 1959. His other works include *The Bald Soprano*, *The Lesson*, *The Chairs*, *Jack or The Submission*, *The Killer*, *Exit the King*, *Hunger and Thirst*, *Macbett*, and *Journeys among the Dead*.

MARTIN CRIMP (Translator) is a British playwright whose work includes In the Republic of Happiness, Play House, The City, Fewer Emergencies, Cruel and Tender (written for Luc Bondy), Face to the Wall, The Country, Attempts on Her Life, The Treatment, Getting Attention, No One Sees the Video, Play with Repeats, Dealing with Clair and Definitely the Bahamas. His translations of plays include Botho Strauss's Gross und klein. Ionesco's Rhinocéros and Les Chaises, Marivaux's La Fausse Suivante and Le Triomphe de l'amour, Genet's Les Bonnes, Koltès's Roberto Zucco, Chekhov's The Seagull and Molière's Le Misanthrope. He first collaborated with composer George Benjamin in 2006 on Into the Little Hill. In the UK his work has been produced by the Royal Shakespeare Company, National Theatre, Almeida, Young Vic, Complicité and the Royal Court Theatre, where he was Writer in Residence in 1997. In New York his work has been seen at The Public Theater, Classic Stage Company, on Broadway and at the Metropolitan Opera, New York. Crimp's work has been translated into

many languages and produced at international venues including Piccolo Teatro, Milan, Sala Beckett, Barcelona, Théâtre des Bouffes du Nord, Théâtre de la Ville, Schaubühne, Berlin, by the Berliner Ensemble and at the Festival d'Automne in Paris and the Vienna Festival. His awards include the 1993 John Whiting Award for *The Treatment* and the 2005 Premio Ubu for the *Fewer Emergencies* trilogy. In the 2017/18 Season The Royal Opera will premiere his new collaboration with George Benjamin, *Lessons in Love and Violence*.



DAVID M. LONG (Director, Mary Moody Northen Theatre Artistic Director) is an actor, director and educator who has worked professionally throughout the U.S. and in Japan. Long has served as a faculty member at Winthrop

University in South Carolina and Portland State University in Oregon and currently serves as artistic director and associate professor of

Theater Arts at St. Edward's University. Directing credits at Mary Moody Northen Theatre include The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui, Mr. Burns, a post-electric play (Austin Critics Table Award for Outstanding Direction), Love and Information, Tartuffe, Museum, Under Construction, The Further Adventures of Hedda Gabler (Austin Critics Table Award for Outstanding Comedy), the world premiere production of David Chamber's The Imaginary Invalid, On The Verge, bobrauschenbergamerica (Austin Critics Table Award for Outstanding Ensemble Performance), Cloud 9, Full Circle (Austin Critics Table Award for Best Comedy), Macbeth and Antigone, At MMNT, he has appeared as Neville Craven in The Secret Garden, John Proctor in The Crucible, Stone in City of Angels, Cyrano (Austin Critics Table Award for Outstanding Acting in a Leading Role) in Cyrano de Bergerac and Leo Frank in Parade. Long is an active member in both Actors' Equity Association and the Screen Actors' Guild. He would like to thank his wife. Tracy, and daughters, Amelia and Alura, for their patience and loving support.
