

MISSION STATEMENT OF AUSTIN SHAKESPEARE

Austin Shakespearepresentsprofessionaltheatre of the highest quality with an emphasison the plays of William Shakespearebringing to the public performances that are *fresh*, *bold*, *imaginative*, *thought-provoking*, and *eminently accessible*, connecting to the truths of the past with challenges and possibilities of today.

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR

A play that is both fascinatingly engaging and morally unsettling, *The Taming* of *the Shrew* is still with us. Surprisingly enough, we don't reject it as reprehensible or archaic. Although we explicitly claim that women should not be subjugated to men, we still see women as objects of desire in our culture.

In the world of the play, Kate is clearly wild - even out of her own control at times and desperately unhappy. Petruchio brings a gust of fresh air in to her world; he is a mate and a match for her. And indeed, she is transformed though their relationship. By her final speech, she teaches other women the debt they owe to men; and she is sincere. Her final words do not have a drop of irony. Men take care of women: one might say that was true in 1600, but not now, and that Shakespeare would not write this story after the Industrial Revolution freed women from domestic dependence on men. But in a very real sense, that is beside the point.

The play deserves consideration even though it is morally reprehensible. Next year Austin Shakespeare will explore anti-Semitism in Shakespeare with *The Merchant* of *Venice*. As a work or enduring art, it is also worthy of exploration, and we are not as free from these moral failings as we pretend today.

Tonight, we take our journey into the world of "Shrew" through an entire cast of extraordinary women - through their voices, bodies and hearts. Tonight, we share the human dynamics of a range of male and female characters. We are penetrated by Shakespeare's brilliant dialogue once more. We are still curious about the play and still captivated by its relationships.

In rehearsals for this staged reading, new questions have emerged: What about Petruchio? How is he changed? Has he changed? What about all the other men and women in the play? What do they make of the taming of Kate? Those are questions I hope we can discuss at the conclusion of our *Shrew*, and I hope you will share your own thoughts. Thank you so much for joining our circle in The Curtain Theater tonight..

Favorite roles to date are wife to husband Tim and mother to their two boys Thomas and Joseph.

Favorite roles include Portia (The Merchant of Venice), Hero (Much Ado About Nothing), Violet (Man and Superman) Phoebe (Quality Street) and Desdemona (Othello). She received a BFA in performance from the Theatre Conservatory at Webster University. When not on stage, Gwen manages the Scottish Rite Theatre and teaches with ZACH. Rabbits. Jenny also directed the site specific pieces You Are Pretty and Spurt. Jenny was recently awarded "Outstanding Direction" from the Austin Critics Table in 2007-08 for her work with Voices Underwater and You Are Pretty. In addition to her work with SVT, Jenny has worked as an actor or a director with Rude Mechs, ZACH Theater, Austin Playhouse, Frontera @ Hyde Park, The Vortex, St. Edward's Mary Moody Northen Theater, and Pro-Arts Collective. LINDA NENNO (Gremio) is thrilled to be working with Austin Shakespeare again at the Curtain Theatre. Thank you Richard Garriot! When she is not doing Shakespeare, she is teaching Voice and Diction at Texas State University in SaA Marcos. Linda made her Broadway debut many years ago as "Sandy" in Grease, which was the start of her professional theatre career that has continued through over 60 productions. JILL K. SWANSON (Petruchio) Jill K. Swanson is an actor, director, writer and teacher who has worked in the Austin theatre scene for the past 13 years, including a longstanding relationship with Austin Shakespeare, and most recently assistant-directed Romeo and juliet for Austin Shakespeare in Zilker Park. Past performances with AS include "Prosepero" in Spooky Shakespeare, "Beatrice" in Much Ado About Nothing, "Desdemona" in Othello, "Helena" in A Midsummer Night's Dream & "Portia" in julius Caeser. Most recently, Austin audiences saw her in Twelfth Night (2008) and As You Like It (2009) at the Scottish Rite Theatre. She is a co-editor of 111 Shakespeare Monologues an [i]60 Shakespeare Scenes and runs SHAKESPEARE ALOUD, a weekly Austin Shakespeare reading group.

ANN CICCOLELLA (Artistic Director/Director) became Shakespeare's Artistic Director on Aug. 9, 2007, the same day she received a "Distinguished Service Award" from the City Council for her advocacy in building the creative community of Austin. For the previous 8 years, she was Managing Director for Zachary Scott Theatre Center and from 1990-1999, Ann served as executive director for Austin Circle of Theaters, a service organization for Austin's 70 theaters, dance and music groups. Ann served as artistic director for ZACH's Project InterAct, (1992-94) which toured professional productions to 80,000 students annually throughout Central Texas. At ZACH, Annually served as Stage Director for: Cabaret, Vagina Monologues, Full Gallop, Closer, Master Class, and Misery. At the Zilker Hillside Theatre she directed Sondheim's Into the Woods (1990) and A Midsummer Night's Dream (1992) for the Austin Shakespeare Festival. Before moving to Austin, Ann. served as Associate Director. for Shakespeare-on-Wheels from the University of Maryland Baltimore Country. For ten years, she led the Renaissance Theater Company as Artistic Director, producing and directing Off Broadway and along the East Coast including an outdoor uncut Romeo and juliet.. In New York, Ann also directed a production of Shakespeare's dark comedy Measure for Measure in Washington Square Park. Ann is a graduate of NYU in Dramatic Literature, History of Theater and Cinema. These days, Ann also leads a professional weekly training program for actors and directors. Shakespeare Studio. After successful runs last season of Macbeth, An Ideal Husband, and Romeo & juliet, she has followed this season with Measure for Measure and Mary Stuart. She is currently working on The Dream: A Midsummer Night's Dream as a 1960's Musical...

ALEX B. ALFORD (Managing Director) is pleased to serve as Austin Shakespeare's first Managing Director. He comes to the company from Austin Lyric Opera, where he spent 14 years in a variety of jobs, from Director of Administration to Director of Board & Volunteer Services.

Previous experience included a 12-year stint at ZACH Theatre, where he was Box Office Manager, Volunteer Coordinator, and Project InterAct Business Manager.. He was honored to work with Artistic Director Ann Ciccolella at Project InterAct during the last two years of his time at ZACH. He has served as President of the Board of Austin Circle of Theaters and Treasurer for the Rude Mechs.



CHRISTINA GUTIERREZ (Dramaturg) is a Ph.D. student in Performance as Public Practice at the University of Texas at Austin, with a research focus on the representation of medieval history on stage, particularly in Shakespeare's history plays. She has worked as a dramaturg and text coach both

academically and professionally, most recently for Austin Shakespeare's Mary Stuart, last fall's Measure for Measure and the inaugural Young Shakespeare production of The Comedy of Errors. Other dramaturgy credits include UTs Midsummer, Portrait, 101 Ways To... and The Psyche Project along with work with Scottish Rite's Summer Shakespeare, the Rude Mechs, Salvage Vanguard Theatre, the Colorado Shakespeare Festival, The University of Colorado at Boulder, and Whittier College. Upcoming projects include Hamlet with a group of Austin Shakespeare veterans, and The Dream and Merry Wives of Windsor with Austin Shakespeare.



JADE WHITE (Stage Manager) This is Jade's fourth production with Austin Shakespeare. Recently, she was properties mistress for Mary Stuart, properties assistant for Spooky Shakespeare and a member of the deck crew for Measure for Measure. Last October, Jade was the scenic designer for

Austin's B. Iden Payne Awards. Jade has also worked as the properties designer and production assistant for the professional premiere of *House* of *Several Stories*, which garnered six nominations and two awards at the 2009 B. Iden Paynes. Jade is originally from San Antonio and is a recent graduate of Texas State University with a BFA in Theatre and a Teacher's Certification. Jade enjoys her work with Austin theatre and plans to pursue her master's in Scenic Design.


