

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Anton Chekhov (1860-1904) was a physician, a humanitarian, a playwright, the grandson of a serf, and is considered by many to be the greatest short story writer in all of literature. He once claimed that he thought of medicine as his wife and literature as his mistress, and his plays contain an affection that sets them apart from other dramas of the period. There are no heroes or villains, and sometimes "nothing" happens. Still, these openly-drawn tragicomedies continue to strike a chord with people around the world.

In working on Uncle Vanya (written in 1896), while adhering to a sense of appropriate period, we have allowed ourselves to explore Chekhov's many subtextual possibilities, have experimented with the many different colors and intentions that may exist behind the words. "You really are aggravating," for example, takes on completely new meaning when said as a flirtation. So these characters are, in this instance, an actor's playground, where more exploration leads to more insight, layering, tenderness, darkness, and revelation.

The major themes in the play are no surprise: unrequited love; the suppression of a heart's desire; parental neglect; missed opportunity. But Uncle Vanya also contains a fervently held concern for mankind's needless and egregious destruction of natural resources, both personally and ecologically, a concern facing us with glaring immediacy today. "What are people going to say about all this a hundred years from now?" Astrov asks. Well, here we are. What are we saying?

CAST BIOS

Anthony Ciaravino (Astrov, the doctor) has been seen on many stages across San Antonio. After graduating from UIW, he went on to earn an MFA in Acting from the professional actor training program at the University of Minnesota. Following Grad school, Anthony worked at the Guthrie for the 6 seasons. Representative roles at the Guthrie include Demetrius in A Midsummer Night's Dream, Don John in Much Ado About Nothing, Trouble/ Doctor in In the Blood, and Chamberlain in The Invention of Love. Among the roles Anthony has played in San Antonio are Hamlet, Romeo, and Macbeth. Currently, he is in charge of the Theater Arts curriculum in the Upper School at Keystone School.

Anne Collins (Marina, the housekeeper) has wanted to perform since her school days at P.S. 54 in Buffalo, NY. The Extended Run Players at UIW gave her the chance and she has performed in Blithe Spirit, The Radio Show and Memories on Review: Tales of WWII. She wishes to thank Andy for this opportunity.

Laura Darnell (Sonya) is a University of the Incarnate Word alum with a B.A in Theater Arts. Her acting credits include: The Miser, Far Away, TomFoolery, On the Verge, A Christmas Carol, The Glass Menagerie, The Clean House, and Three Days of Rain. She has worked backstage in UIW's productions of la malasangre, and Anton in Showbusiness, and served as wardrobe supervisor in Cinderella. This her first performance in the San Antonio theatre community outside of UIW.

Justin Laughlin (III ya III ich Telegin "Waffles") was last seen onstage in The Overtime Theatre original production of "The Good Samaritan". A graduate of The University of the Incarnate Word, he has a B.A. in Theatre Arts & Philosophy. Previous notable roles include Yusef El-Fayoumy in Attic Rep's production of Last Days of Judas Iscariot and Boyd Middleton in The San Pedro Playhouse production of Book of Days. Other productions at the San Pedro Playhouse include As Bees in Honey Drown and Over the River and Through the Woods. Previous credits at UIW include Blue Window (Tom), Beast on the Moon (Aram), Othello (Montano)

Sam Mandelbaum (Yefim, a hired man) since he went to study theatre at the University of North Carolina School of the Arts, Sam has acted in and assistant directed a number of productions, with fondest memories of West Side Story, Balm in Gilead, and Ah! Wilderness. Also, last spring he directed Say de Kooning and RW&B Review for UNCSA (which he thinks sounded way better and less pretentious before they tagged on the U). He is a founding member of the Convergent Theatre Co. of SATX, with acting credits in Snakebit, Sight Unseen, and Never the Sinner (surviving a short run off-off broadway). Most recently he co-authored and directed An Inconvenient Nose at the Magik Theatre as CTC's first original work. Before returning to NC to complete his BFA in Directing in 2010, Sam plans to gain a more diverse arts education and to go on an adventure. And no, he doesn't know what that means either.

John Minton (Uncle Vanya) along with his wife Amy, were the founders of Firelight Players, a highly acclaimed company that produced many award winning productions. Some fond roles include Sideman, Strange Snow and The Cripple of Inishmaan and Sea Marks.

Allan S. Ross (Serebryakov) is the co-artistic director of The Classic Theatre, Professor Emeritus of Theatre, and a founder of The Summer Repertory Company, has worked professionally in theatre as an actor, director, and designer. Some of his favorite acting roles are; C.S. Lewis in Shadowlands, Roy Cohn in Angels in America, Brackish in Park your Car in Harvard Yard, and Andrew in Sleuth. He has received recognition for his work in San Antonio theatre by receiving 15 Alamo Theatre Arts Council Globe Awards in the areas of acting. directing and design. He was also given ATAC's highest award, The Jasmina Wellinghoff award for special contributions to theatre in San Antonio.

Terri Peña Ross (Marya Vasilyevna) received her BA in Theatre from the University of Texas at Austin and her MA in Directing from Southwest Texas State. She is a Globe Award winner. Some favorite roles have been as mother and teacher as well as Enchanted April at the Playhouse, Glass Menagerie with The Classic Theatre, Quilters with Offstage Inc. and Wit with Firelight Players.

Emily Spicer (Yelena) is a Globe Award-winning actress who last appeared on stage at the Jump Start Theater as Dr. Livingstone in Agnes of God. Prior to that, she appeared in a one-woman show as Coco Chanel in the San Pedro Playhouse Cellar Theater production of No. 5. Other favorite roles include naughty cook Suzette in the Cameo Theatre production of Don't Dress for Dinner, runaway bride Rosannah De Luce in Brilliant Traces, and the conniving Alexa Vere de Vere in As Bees in Honey Drown.

STAFF BIOS

Andrew Thornton (Director) holds a BFA in Drama from the University of North Carolina School of the Arts and a Diploma in Directing and Russian Language from GITIS, the Lunacharsky Institute, in Moscow. He was a founding member of the Knights of Indulgence Theatre United States (KITUS), which had its homes in Delaware and Northern California, and more recently, directed the theatre program at Churchill High School, where his favorite directing projects were Red Noses, One Hundred Demons!, and his own adaptation of Chekhov's Seagull. Andrew is also an actor, and has received honors for his roles in Rabbit Hole, The Pillowman, and Lincolnesque. He was most recently seen as Mason in Take Me Out and as Martin in The Goat, or Who is Sylvia? Andy is a company member of AtticRep, and looks forward to directing Scott McDowell's sequel to The Good Samaritan at the Overtime Theatre this fall.

Margaret Mitchell (Costume Designer) is a freelance costume and scenic designer and a Professor of Theatre at the University of the Incarnate Word. Her design work has represented the United states three times at the Prague Quadrennial. She recently received the Jasmina Wellinghoff Special Contribution to the Theatre Award, and she was the Moody Professor at UIW last year. With Dr. Oscar Brockett and Linda Hardberger she has co authored a new book, Making the Scene: A History of Stage Design and Technology in Europe and the United States. This is her first design for the Classic Theatre.

George Burnette (Lighting Designer) is the Technical Director at The University of the Incarnate Word. He is a graduate of Southwest Texas State University and of The University of the Incarnate Word. George has been designing lights, sound and scenery at UIW since 1979. A member of the San Antonio theatre community since 1973 he has numerous design credits and worked at many of the theatres in San Antonio. In 2006, he designed scenery at Jump Start for Rudy Harst's original piece, *Hurry Slowly*.

Yinelly Arnold (Stage Manager) is currently the Assistant Technical Director at San Antonio College. Her past credits include Just a Kiss, Pain of the Macho, Baby with the Bathwater, Twelfth Night, Charlotte's Web. She has also worked around town as a stage manager for Las Nuevas Tamaleras, Lincolnesque, and One for the Road.
