JOEY HOOD (W., The Captain, Marie, The Carnival Barker, The Young Officer, The Doctor, The Grandmother) is originally from Mississippi, but he has been living and working in Austin for almost twenty years. He is a company member of Hyde Park Theatre and the Rude Mechs, and has been working with the Army for the past seven years in suicide and domestic abuse prevention.

GEORG BÜCHNER (Playwright, Woyzeck) was born October 17, 1813 in Goddelau, Darmstadt. During his studies at the university in Giessen, he became active in politics, affiliating with the radical leftist groups and writing political pamphlets and forming the Society for Human Rights. Fleeing arrest, he completed his studies in Strasbourg and then took a position as a lecturer at the University of Zurich. He died the following year of typhoid fever. To this day, theatre artists, critics, and academics revere Büchner's plays as amongst the earliest works of naturalism and expressionism. His plays are known for their short scenes, naturalistic characters, and their emphasis on middle and lower classes of society. Woyzeck is Büchner's final, unfinished work — a drama in fragments.

ZACHARY E. CHRISTMAN (Playwright, W.) hails from Lake Jackson, TX, a small town just south of Houston. While earning his bachelor's degree in Theatre and English from Texas State University, he led a small theatre company called Troupe Texas for which he wrote and directed many plays. After graduating, Zachary has since continued his work in the theatre while also working as a high school English teacher, and now as a full-time grant writer. Some of his works have been performed by the Austin Jewish Repertory Theater (Aggadot Baya'ar: Folktales in the Forest and Izzy and Barry in the Schticky Scheckel Show). In 2008, Zachary adapted and acted in the first incarnation of W., called Woyzeck Agonistes. He is thrilled to see the play take on new life.

SCOTT FERGUSON (Set Designer/Projections/Sound) enjoys his time in the theatre both on and offstage, focusing equally on performing and set design/construction. He most recently designed the set for Austin Jewish Repertory Theater and TILT Performance Group's As Butterflies, as well as AJRT and Trinity Street Players' Into the Woods, and Leander High School's set for How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying. Scott's experience extends to the administrative side of theatre as well, including past positions as Residential Director for Texas Arts Project and as a member of the AJRT Committee. Scott's graphic design work keeps him busy with various projects in Austin.

JOHN ROBERT HOOD, JR. (Translator, Woyzeck Agonistes), of Lockhart, Texas, passed away on July 17th, 2015. A teacher, writer, storyteller, technician, musician, leader, and beloved friend, John lived an incredibly full life. John's intellect carried him from his hometown in rural Tennessee to Vanderbilt, and eventually on to the Yale School of Drama, where he served many years as the Chair of Technical Design and Production and the Production Manager of the Yale Repertory Theatre. In 1980, he moved to the University of Texas, where he headed production for the Performing Arts Center and taught in the Theatre department until 1992, after which he played bluegrass music with his band Hard to Make a Living. In 2001, he returned to teaching at Texas State University—San Marcos while also creating theatre for the public — his translation of Woyzeck was one such project.

JENNY LAVERY (Lighting Designer and Managing Director, AJRT) is an actor, director, producer, lighting designer, and educator, Jenny's work has been locally recognized by the Austin Critic's Table, B. Iden Payne Awards, Central Texas Awards, and the Austin Chronicle. Jenny won Best Director in Central Texas for her work on Bethany with Theatre en Bloc. She is Artistic Director of Theatre en Bloc and received her B.F.A from New York University's Tisch School of the Arts. Jenny also holds a master's degree from Boston Residency Program. Jenny will be directing Theatre en Bloc's insanely funny The Totalitarians, playing Sept 9 - 25 at The Off Center, and the frighteningly haunting Drowning Girls from Sept 29 - Oct 16 at The Vortex. TYLER MABRY (Composer) is a Vortex company member, music director for kidsActing, and pianist at Berkeley United Methodist Church. Persephone, his first full-length musical for adult performers, premiered at Vortex earlier this year. Other credits as a theater composer include Running Wild (ACT), which was nominated for a B. Iden Payne award for Best Original Score, Cuchulain (Vortex), Stuffed! (FronteraFest), Two Gentlemen of Verona (Something for Nothing), and Jive, Kitty! (ACT). He has also composed numerous sacred choral works, including a Christmas cantata (The True Light, with Victoria Schwarz), and "I Heard the Voice of Jesus" (soon to be published by Shawnee Press). In September, you can catch Tyler as the musical director/pianist for Oh Dragon's production of Songs for a New World, and as the songwriter/composer for the Barbarella-inspired rock spectacle Agent Andromeda (Sky Candy).

ADAM ROBERTS (Artistic Director, AJRT) has served as artistic director, musical director or choreographer for a wide range of companies, productions and initiatives, with choreography credits including two European concert tours. His students have appeared in principal roles on Broadway, Off-Broadway and in regional theatre, been nominated for the Tony Award, and appeared in film, national tours, and on network television. Adam's credits include productions and/or faculty positions with the Austin Jewish Repertory Theater (Artistic Director), The Actor's School (Voice Faculty/Head of Musical Theatre), Long Center for the Performing Arts (Resident Musical Director for Education), and TILT Performance Group (Co-Artistic Director), in addition to serving Austin's St. Luke United Methodist Church as Music Director. He holds a master's degree in music from the Florida State University and is a recipient of the B. Iden Payne Award for Outstanding Music Direction and the Shalom Austin Exemplar of Excellence Award. JARED SLACK (Filmographer) apologizes for not being an Austin native. He moved here in 2014 and is part of the problem on I-35. He spends his day-to-day life serving with First Baptist Church as their Minister to Younger Adults and Spiritual Formation. Prior to working on W. with AJRT, he's done photography and video work for The Drowning Girls (Theatre en Bloc), The Totalitarians (Theatre en Bloc), As Butterflies (AJRT & TILT Performance Group), and Into the Woods (Trinity Street Players & AJRT).
